Optometrists to prescribe on PBS

PHARMACISTS can expect to start receiving PBS prescriptions from optometrists from 01 Jan.

Medicare Australia said patients will benefit under the new arrangement, because it will mean they no longer need a doctor's appointment in order to be prescribed some PBS eye medicines.

Currently optometrists can write prescriptions for some eye medicines, but only for non-PBS supply of the drugs.

Medicare said it's liaising with software vendors about the new requirements for dispensing software, which will need to be updated to include optometrists as a new PBS prescriber type.

Arrangements will be similar to those for dentist prescribing.

Board level disciplinary proceedings were commenced in 22 cases finalised in 06/07, resulting in a number of cautions. reprimands and undertakings.

There were two registrations cancelled by the Qld Health Practitioners Tribunal, with conditions placed on future registration of the offenders.

During the year there was a net increase of 231 Qld registrants, bringing the total of pharmacists registered in the state to 4517, of whom 50.2% are female.

UK pharmacy deal

BRITISH retailer The Co-Operative Group has acquired 51 new pharmacy branches in the north of England.

The outlets currently trade as either Peak Pharmacy or Tims and Parker, and were purchased from PCT Healthcare Group.

With this purchase The Co-Operative Group will have 779 pharmacies across the UK.

PharmAust sale

PUBLICLY listed WA firm PharmAust Limited has announced its biggest ever single order, for the supply of more than \$1m worth of sunscreen products under the Natural Instinct brand.

Natural Instinct products are distributed through more than 3000 pharmacies across the country, with PharmAust also set to add additional personal care and skin care lines to the brand.

PharmAust said the initial order has the "ability to make a significant contribution to achieving profitable operations for the first time in the company's history".

RGH e-Bulletin

THIS week's edition of the Repatriation General Hospital Pharmacy e-Bulletin deals with drugs associated with increased risk of fractures and/or osteoporosis.

The bulletin describes strategies which can be undertaken to cut the risk of bone problems in patients who are prescribed with corticosteroids, anticonvulsants and thiazolidinediones.
