SYDNEY-based respiratory drug specialist Pharmaxis has established a North American subsidiary to be based in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The company said the "strategic US presence" would strengthen its expanding US clinical and regulatory program "and prepare for the commercialisation of both Aridol and Bronchitrol in the US."

CEO Alan Robertson said the firm plans to commence two US Phase III clinical trials of Bronchitrol in the first quarter of next year, as well as filing a new drug application for Aridol with the US Food and Drug Administration.

The US operation will be headed up by Stephen Beckman, who previously headed up respiratory firm Exaeris and whose career also includes roles at GlaxoSmithKline and AstraZeneca.

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THE Pharmacy Guild is reminding pharmacies that if they register for the Dose Administration Aid program before 31 Dec they'll qualify for an early registration payment of \$1000.

A statement issued yesterday confirmed that more than 2500 pharmacies had already registered for the program, which is part of the Better Community Health Initiative of the Fourth Community Pharmacy Agreement.

UK Nicorette move

BRITISH health authorities have issued a consultation document relating to the proposed reclassification of Nicorette Inhalators from Pharmacy-Only to General Sale.

Pharmacia Limited is requesting the change, with its application pointing out that although the inhalator is pharmacy-only, other nicotine replacement products including patches, gum, lozenges and tablets are already "considered to be suitable for sale without the supervision of a pharmacist" in the UK.

Novogen trial

NOVOGEN Limited yesterday reported positive results in a phase 1b clinical trial of a new drug for inflammatory bowel disease (IBD).

The company said its drug NV-52 is a "novel compound..as an oral agent for the maintenance of remission in IBD".

Novogen said results of the trial indicated that treatment of the chronic, incurable condition may be possible with a single daily oral dose of the drug.

In mouse trials NV-52, which is a synthetic phenolic derivative, was found to be effective at reducing the initiation and severity of acute inflammation in the bowel.

Complementary medicine centre

NSW Premier Morris lemma recently announced the establishment of a joint research centre into traditional Chinese medicines, as a collaboration between the University of Sydney and Sun Yat-sen University in Guangzhou.

Dubbed The Australia-China Centre for Research in Chinese Medicines, the centre "will be a world class partnership between Australia and China to study and develop traditional Chinese medicine for modern health markets," lemma said.

He also announced a new Joint Chair in Traditional Chinese Medicine, to be based at the University of Sydney and the University of Western Sydney.

FDA equivocal on phenylephrine

THE US Food and Drug Administration is considering boosting the effective dose of phenylephrine in medications, after claims that the current 10mg OTC dose isn't sufficient.

The issue has arisen after a big increase in the use of the drug as a pseudoephedrine alternative in the light of widespread diversion of pseudoephedrine-based medications for illicit drug manufacture.

The FDA has reviewed several phenylephrine studies, including 14 on a 10mg dose and 10 looking at a 25mg dose, and said about half of the studies in both cases found the dose was effective.

Peak US manufacturing body The Consumer Healthcare Product Association said its analysis of phenylephrine data showed the 10mg dose is safe and effective, adding that "there is no convincing data to support that increasing the dose of phenylephrine to 25 milligrams is necessary".

Gardasil OK- CSL

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration and manufacturer CSL say media reports of adverse reactions to cervical cancer vaccine Gardasil shouldn't give rise to safety concerns.

More than 2.2 million Gardasil vaccinations have been already administered, with the 500 or so reports of adverse reactions "consistent with those expected

with any vaccine," the TGA said.

JAPANESE scientists have made a breakthrough in dentistry, with the creation of a robot which is able to feel pain.

The prototype of the humanoid was presented at the 2007 International Robot Exhibition, made up to resemble an attractive young lady wearing a cashmere cardigan.

She's named 'Simroid' and is able to say "ouch," frown and roll her eyes when a trainee dentist's drill hits a nerve.

"Because it's so real, dentistry students can see patients' feelings and will be able to develop good skills as they treat it, not as an object, but a human being," said one of the invetors Tatsuo Matsuzaki.

"The point is that we can share people's pain without hurting people," he added.
