WHO children push

THE World Health Organisation has launched a global campaign which aims to promote research into medicine for children.

The move includes a new List of Essential Medicines for Children, with 206 products safe for kids.

"But a lot remains to be done. There are priority medicines that have not been adapted for children's use or are not available when needed," said a WHO spokesperson.

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NPS assistant training

NATIONAL Prescribing Service has produced its first ever training material targeted directly at pharmacy assistants.

Pharmacies across Australia will shortly receive copies of the training module, which provides teaching materials for community pharmacists to deliver to their pharmacy assistants.

The move follows the recent Generic medicines are an equal choice TV campaign run by National Prescribing Service.

NPS ceo Lynn Weekes said "pharmacy assistants are often the first people consumers speak to about their medicines.

"This module recognises the important role they play in helping consumers make choices about medicines to use them appropriately and safely."

THE earliest written account of wine is in the Old Testament.

US Avandia move

TWO US pharmacy benefits providers have dropped diabetes drug Avandia from their national formularies.

Prime Therapeutics and HealthTrans provide managed pharmaceutical programs for organisations incl US health funds.

Both companies said they'd made the move after analysis of clinical data about Avandia.

GSK said the surprise move was disappointing becuase "it limits options for treatment and could be detrimental for patients".

AUSTRALIAN Pharmaceutical Industries has been removed from the Standards & Poors/Australian Stock Exchange All Australian 200 index, in a regular quarterly rebalancing of the index.

Farm By Nature has commercialised a process which allows alcoholic drinks to be added to chocolate to create the world's first non-liqueur wine chocolates.

Initial flavours available include shiraz, merlot and pinot noir, with a spokesman saying that "While people often eat wine and chocolate together, nobody has yet combined real wine and chocolate in a way that complements both".

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
