TGA resolutions

THE Therapeutic Goods Committee has recommended the establishment of a subcommittee to advise on standards for biologicals, as one of several key resolutions made during its meeting last month.

It's also proposed another committee be established to advise on packaging matters relating to therapeutic goods, to focus on child resistant and nonreclosable packaging moves initiated under the now defunct Australia New Zealand Therapeutic Products Authority.

Other resolutions included proposals for consultation on the adoption of the British Pharmacopoeia 2008 which enters force in the UK on 01 Jan, as well as a new Therapeutic Goods Order to specific microbiological standards for medicines.

Meanwhile rival Healthscope has built its spoiling stake slightly, today confirming it now holds 11.91% of Symbion

aiming to help customers achieve healthy weight via consultations, weight loss products, ideas to improve physical activity and advice on developing an individual eating plan.

Guild President Kos Sclavos said professional services offered by community pharmacies such as weight management mean they provide customers with "a lot more than just medications".

Urgent rural audit

THE department of Health yesterday announced an immediate audit of the "shortage of health professionals in rural and regional Australia."

The report, to be provided by the end of Feb 08, will look at the reasons ofr the shortages to ensure a "thorough picture is presented of this far-reaching problem" across the country.

A statement said the department would provide advice on a range of options for attracting and retaining health professionals in these areas.

A REPORT in this month's Medical Journal of Australia recommends the exact opposite of the baby bonus.

Professor Barry Walters slams the bonus on environmental grounds, saying paying parents for additional children fuels more carbon emissions and "greenhouse-unfriendly behaviour".

Walters argues the bonus should be replaced with a "baby levy" - which he says would be in line with "polluter pays" principles.
