## US\$5 billion bill for Vioxx

MERCK & Co has agreed to pay US\$4.85 billion into a settlement fund to resolve all claims relating to its painkiller Vioxx in the USA.

The company said this didn't contradict a previous pledge to "defend each claim," saying claimants would still have to show "objective, medical proof" of myocardial infarction or ischemic stroke in connection with taking Vioxx.

study revealed a higher risk of heart attack and stroke in patients taking the drug.

The company was defending about 26,600 lawsuits including more than 47,000 plaintiff groups alleging personal injuries resulting from the use of Vioxx.

The landmark settlement will see plaintiffs receiving payments depending on how long they took the drug and the severity of any adverse reactions.

Merck stressed that the US deal wasn't a class action settlement, and didn't admit any liability.

It said that in other jurisdictions it would "continue to vigorously defend" Vioxx litigation in court.
