THE European Union has issued a statement warning about potential "severe hypersensitivity reactions" to the use of Protelos and Osseor, which are used for the non-hormonal treatment of postmenopausal osteoporosis.

The EU medicines agency said it's received reports of 16 cases two of which resulted in fatalities - of 'drug rash with eosinophilia and systemic symptoms (DRESS) in patients treated with the drug.

Having assessed the data the EU has ordered the urgent updating of product information to include warnings about hypersensitivity.

Patients are being advised to stop using the drugs when a rash occurs and seek medical advice.

The reported serious reactions started within 3-6 weeks of the initiation of treatment, with symptoms including skin rashes, fever, swollen glands and an increased white cell count.

## **GSK** grants

LOW influenza immunisation rates for health care workers in primary care settings such as pharmacists have been identified as a major risk, in the wake of this year's severe flu season.

GlaxoSmithKline has awarded \$20,000 to the Mackay Division of General Practice for a proposed Well Workers Immunisation Project,' which aims to increase the rate of health worker flu

vaccination in the Mackay region. GSK also gave \$20,000 to the Melbourne General Practice Network and the Doutta Galla Community Health Service for their program which targets new migrants and refugees.

### Pharmacists strike!

A DISPUTE between pharmacy owners and pharmacists in Finland is set to see the closure of most pharmacies across the country.

The Finnish Pharmacists' Association is pushing for a 17% pay rise (about €500 per month) and is telling members to stay at home if agreement isn't reached.

Customers are being warned of delays and limited opening hours at the 800-odd pharmacies in Finland.

# Rimonabant trial

A PAPER published in The Lancet this week has linked sanofi-aventis' weight-loss drug Acomplia (rimonabant) with a higher risk of depression.

The Age said the study analysed four trials involving over 4000 patients, and found people using the drug were much more likely to stop treatment due to depressive or anxious symptoms.

Sanofi-Aventis said the data was based on old research but agreed that caution was required with the use of any drug.

The company said it would continue to push for TGA approval of the medication, which is in use in 37 countries across the globe
