Arthritis awareness

ARTHRITIS Australia is offering pharmacists free information sheets on common and rare forms of arthritis and musculoskeletal pain as a special initiative of Arthritis Awareness Week, which takes place 06-12 Apr.

The 29 sheets were written by pharmacists, physiotherapists, rheumatologists and GPs, and were reviewed by consumers.

Dr Mona Marabani, President of Arthritis Australia said: "There's quite a bit of evidence that if you have arthritis of some kind, just knowing about it and understanding your options can relieve the pain."

New 'healthy but high-risk' treatment

A MEDICATION used to lower blood pressure can protect 'healthy but high-risk' people from heart attack, heart failure, stroke and death.

According to the results of a six-year study, which involved 25,620 patients including more than 1,300 Australians, telmisartan (Micardis) matched ramipril (Tritace, Ramace and Altace) in providing cardiovascular protection, with a reduced rate of side-effects, regardless of a person's blood pressure levels.

Published in the New England Journal of Medicine, the landmark trial concluded that patients receiving telmisartan experienced less coughing and swelling of body tissues, and were more likely to remain on therapy compared with those receiving ramipril.

Australian coordinator for the ONTARGET study, Professor Garry Jennings from the Baker Heart Research Institute, said the results suggested appropriate treatment with telmisartan could equate to 10,000 fewer deaths in Australia each year.

MS drug subsidy

SENSIPAR, a renal disease treatment, and Tysabri, a multiple sclerosis medicine, will be subsidised for Australian patients from July 1, the Government confirmed last night.

According to a report in today's *Daily Telegraph*, MS sufferers were upset the Government yesterday approved the PBS listing of a once-a-day Ritalin pill while they were still waiting for help with the expense of their treatments, which costs some patients up to \$37,000 a year.

Cabinet was not scheduled to discuss the subsidies for Sensipar and Tysabri until April 22, nine days after Prime Minister Kevin Rudd returned from a 17-day overseas trip.

His office said last night subsidies cutting the cost of the medicines to \$31.30 for general patients and \$5 for pensioners would apply from 01 Jul. local pharmacist as the main source of nutritional advice.

In fact one in three Australian parents rely on the internet as the main source of info - ahead of GPs, dietitions or nutritionists.

ICCIDD vice chairman Prof Creswell Eastman said the reliance on the often incorrect internet highlights the need for health professionals to "discuss the importance of regular iodine intake with pregnant women and parents of young children."

The iodine push follows a plan by Food Standards Australia New Zealand to mandate the addition of iodine to bread, with the regulator saying there is evidence of iodine deficiency in Australia.

A new food standard recently introduced also orders the addition of folate to bread from Sep 09 at the latest.

TGA ticks Gardasil

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration has approved cross protection data submitted by CSL for its Gardasil HPV vaccine.

The data shows that Gardasil has demonstrated cross-protective efficacy against cervical disease caused by additional types of HPV.

The new information is now included in the updated product information for the vaccine.

e-Health changes

HEALTH minister Nicola Roxon has affirmed her support for the National e-Health Transition Authority (NEHTA) after the sudden resignation this week of its chief executive, lan Reinecke.

Roxon said she was "confident that NEHTA will continue to deliver its work program" as it searches for a new ceo.

NEHTA has been criticised for not engaging with professional bodies as it develops standards for the administration of electronic medical records.

Electronic medicine received a major boost last week with the announcement of the formation of ScriptX by a group of Australia's leading prescribing and dispensing software suppliers.

The Pharmacy Guild has put its money where its mouth is in support of ScriptX, pre-purchasing the first 10 million transactions on the system for Guild members, which should allow the system to be effectively trialled in pharmacies across Australia.

A US transgender man who kept his female reproductive organs is now five months pregnant.

34-year-old Thomas Beatie of Oregon is "married "but his wife is unable to conceive because she's had a hysterectomy.

Beatie, formerly known as Tracy Lagondino, had chest reconstructive surgery and took testosterone to become a man.

However when he decided to fall pregnant he stopped taking the hormones and then artificially inseminated himself with anonymous donor sperm.

"Wanting to have a biological child is neither a male nor female desire, but a human desire," he claimed.

THE all-pervasive internet has made its way into the funeral industry.

UK firm Wesley Music has launched a new service which offers pay-per-view funerals, allowing mourners who can't attend in person to pay their respects online.

The funeral webcasts will cost about £75 (A\$200) and will be captured by a small camera mounted in the chapels of crematoria across Britain.

The company insisted that the funerals remain private and intimate despite being broadcast on the web, with mourners requiring a password before being able to access the footage.

"Families are dispersed across the world these days and sometimes it's the case that someone cannot get home in time for a funeral," said Wesley Music spoksman Alan Jeffrey.
