Youth summit talks health

PHARMACEUTICAL companies should be rewarded for creating drugs aimed at improving global health, suggested delegates at the 2020 youth summit on the weekend.

In particular, the Government should reward drug manufacturers that help fight diseases in poor countries, with the aim to make drugs to poor nations cheaper and more accessible.

One hundred delegates aged 15 to 24 spent the weekend in Canberra describing their vision for Australia.

Yesterday they released a topten list of ideas to improve the nation, including setting up a federally-funded peak body to look at preventative health strategies.

Another Stilnox exoneration

A LANDMARK court ruling in Sydney last week found a man not guilty of drink driving because he had also taken a Stilnox tablet.

Robert James Kingston was appealing against an earlier local court verdict where he was found guilty of driving with a blood alcohol level of 0.105.

The judge said he was satisfied the scientific evidence was strong enough to "at least raise a possibility, a real possibility, that the explanation for what happened on this occasion was a case of sleep-driving caused by the use of the drug."

Generic conference

GENERIC Medicines Australia (PD Fri) is the title of an upcoming conference in Sydney.

Comments attributed in Fri's issue to Alexandra Berecry were made in her capacity as a staffer for the conference organiser, Terapinn, and not on behalf of the Generics Medicines Industry Association (GMiA).

Eleven of the delegates have been chosen to attend next weekend's 2020 summit.

Michael Loftus, a second-year medical student at Monash University, called for a greater focus on preventive health care.

He said young people wanted a system that recognised that "health is a right, not a commodity".

"The ideas I presented were to increase mental health education in schools and provide incentives for businesses to encourage their employees to maintain a better standard of health," he told The Age.

NSW rent advocate

THE NSW govt has announced the creation of an Office of the Retail Advocate, which would have the power to investigate unscrupulous landlords.

The advocate would have the power to seize documents from shopping centre operators accused of predatory tactics and unconscionable conduct.
