OTC Tamiflu push

TAMIFLU may soon be available without a prescription if it is given the go-ahead by the National Drugs and Poisons Scheduling Committee.

NDPSC is again considering whether the flu medication should be down-scheduled from S4 to S3 after it received a submission calling for the change in classification.

Roche, which markets the drug, said it was not behind the submission.

Pharmacy Guild president Kos Scalvos also said the Guild had not made a submission but it was expected to support the move.

The committee blocked an earlier attempt to make Tamiflu available over the counter in 2005 because of fears the move could lead to drug-resistant flu strains.

New NPS structure

A Cialis a day keeps Viagra away

A NEW dosage of tadalafil, launched today, is expected to rival Viagra and Levitra.

The Therapeutic Goods Administration has approved a smaller-dose once-daily tablet that will make men ready for sexual intercourse at any time without having to plan ahead.

Tadalafil (Cialis) has been on the market in Australia for five years but was available only in 10 and 20 mg doses that had to be taken hours before sex in the same way as other antiimpotence drugs.

But the TGA's decision will see a packet of 28 Cialis tablets available from on prescription for about \$170 a month.

Rather than take a Viagra up to four hours before sex, men can now pop a Cialis every morning and have a more spontaneous approach to romance.

DISPENSARY CORNER

IT'S a tough job, but somebody has to do it.

Researchers in the UK are calling for 150 female volunteers to eat a bar of chocolate every day for a year.

The University of East Anglia trial is part of a study aiming to discover whether flavonoids, commonly found in cocoa, can reduce the risk of heart disease in women with type 2 diabetes.

The specially formulated chocolate bars, created for the trial by a Belgian chocolatier, only weigh 27g and have been fortified with extra flavonoids, with the subjects also continuing to take statins during the trial.

THE mayor of a small town in Chile, South America, has announced plans to distribute free Viagra to male residents aged sixty and over.

Gonzalo Navarrete is mayor of Lo Prado, an impoverished town south of Santiago, and said the proposal would see four 50 milligram tablets given out to each man each month.

"This has to do with quality of life and it's done responsibly," he said.

"It's not just like handing out candy at the corner."

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
