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ADRAC warns on Champix

Guild of Australia This week's update from the Guild Countdown to Industrial Award Decision

The Pharmacy

THE Pharmacy Guild of Australia continues to make strong representations to the Australian Industrial Relations Commission (AIRC) against the inclusion of community pharmacy in the proposed Retail Industry Award 2010.

Pharmacy Guild representatives and counsel appeared before the AIRC in Melbourne on 5 November to press the Guild's argumentS against the move foreshadowed in the Exposure Draft released in September.

One of the points made by the Guild was that there is now no union or other organisation contending that community pharmacy is purely retail or advocating that it should be incorporated into the general retail award.

Another point strongly put was that the original statement on award modernisation by Minister Julia Gillard required that the modernised award system be "simple" and "not intended to increase costs for employers."

The proposal currently put forward by the Commission fails both these tests, and would have a serious impact on the operation of many community pharmacies across Australia.

The Guild will continue to do all within its power to defend the unique position of community pharmacies, leading up to 19 December, the scheduled date for the Commission's final decision. A LINK between smoking cessation drug Champix (varenicline) and neuropsychiatric events is "increasingly likely" the TGA has warned.

Up to October 2008, the TGA's Adverse Drug Reactions Unit has received 339 adverse reaction reports with Champix, 255 (72%) of which describe "psychiatric symptoms including depression, aggression, agitation, abnormal dreams, insomnia, hallucination and anger. There have also been reports of suicidal/self-injurious ideation or behaviour."

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cause of these symptoms in some patients, but "it appears increasingly likely with accumulating experience that there is an association between varenicline and serious neuropsychiatric events."

Overseas safety alerts have also linked varenicline with serious neuropsychiatric behavioural changes, and the Australian Champix PI and CMI alerts prescribers to the possibility of such side effects with varenicline treatment.

TGA has also received 15 reports of seizures in patients using varenicline but their history was not known; however, prescribers are advised to exercise caution when prescribing varenicline to patients with a history of seizure disorder.

PBS report

ACCESS to Medicines Working Group (AMWG) has released an interim report discussing the effects of statutory price reductions on the listing of new medicines on the PBS.

It also explores how to manage uncertainty in the assessment of medicines for PBS-listing.

AMWG is a joint Department of Health and Ageing and Medicines Australia panel that advises on ways of achieving appropriate access to new PBS medicines.
