A \$1.6 billion COAG investment will deliver more health professionals and health services to indigenous communities.

The funding will target chronic disease and risk factors such as smoking.

Around \$470 million will be provided for general practice incentives and support; increased access to specialist and allied healthcare services; and the expansion of the Medical Specialists Outreach Assistance Program.

The package also includes \$171 million to help frontline primary care workers.

Don't smoke daily

YOUNG female smokers who have some cigarette-free days are twice as likely to quit as daily smokers, according to an Australian study.

Researchers looked at changes in smoking behaviour over seven years among almost 1000 females aged 18-23.

They found that in women who were initially daily smokers, a reduction to non-daily smoking was the strongest predictor of cessation.

The likelihood of cessation was also increased by getting married, said the report in Nicotine and Tobacco.

PHARMACISTS and GPs want central information resources on complementary medicines they can access through the internet or prescribing/dispensing software, according to the latest findings from research conduced by the National Prescribing Service.

"When GPs and pharmacists are with patients they don't want to waste time having to search for information about complementary medicines. They would like a fast, one-stop location where they can find information about adverse effects, interactions with other medicines, contraindications and clinical evidence" said NPS CEO Dr Lynn Weekes.

According to the NPS survey, pharmacists most frequently use internet search engines, MIMS/ APPGuide, colleagues, textbooks, Australian Pharmaceutical Formulary and Handbook and the Australian Medicines Handbook for information about

No asthma link

A BABY'S use of antibiotics in its first year does not increase its risk of developing asthma or atopy, according to a WA study.

No link was found in the study of almost 200 children at high

atopic risk from birth to age five. Although previous research has indicated an association, this could be because "both antibiotic use and a doctor diagnosis of asth are related to early infection," the researchers wrote in *Clinical* and Experimental Allergy.

"Furthermore, no dose response effect was observed between numbers of antibiotic courses and any asthma/atopy outcome."
