ONLY three cases of hypersensitivity to Gardasil have been confirmed by allergists from Melbourne's Royal Children's Hospital, who evaluated 25 girls who experienced urticaria, rash or angiodema after receiving the quadravalent HPV vaccine in 07.

Skin prick tests, clinical review and vaccine rechallenge tests indicated that three of the girls had a hypersensitivity to Gardasil, which contains yeast and aluminium.

"Our data suggest that true hypersensitivity to the quadravalent vaccine is uncommon & that suspected hypersensitivity reactions such as urticaria are often idiosyncratic and not usually a contraindication to further vaccination," the authors said in this week's BMJ.

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THE Federal Government has agreed to implement a reform agenda to update and streamline the regulatory framework for therapeutic goods in Australia.



THAT creepy feeling may be contagious.

Researchers at New York's Stony Brook University have discovered that humans can actually smell fear - and spread the feeling to other people.

They carried out a very creative experiment which involved collecting the perspiration of novice skydivers.

Volunteers who inhaled the fear-ridden sweat experienced more brain activity in areas associated with terror, than those who breathed in a nonfear contaminated sample.

The scientists said the findings confirm the belief that panic can spread throughout passengers on a bus or plane.

The research was funded by the United States military, raising speculation that pheromones could be used to induce terror in opposing troops.
