A NEW breakthrough treatment for people battling chronic myeloid leukaemia (CML) has been approved by the TGA.

Tasigna (nilotinib), a selective Bcr-Abl tyrosine kinase inhibitor, is a new second-line therapy for this life-threatening form of blood cancer.

It is now approved for adult patients with chronic or accelerated phase CML with resistance or intolerance to prior therapy, including Glivec (imatinib).

MALE pilots and even passengers could be reaching extra altitude if the recommendation of an Israeli study into impotence medications are taken up.

The research found that tadalafil, the active ingredient in erectile dysfunction drug Cialis, improved breathing in a thin atmosphere.

Officials in the Israeli Air Force are considering the report, which follows research undertaken by a retired general on the slopes of Mount Kilimanjaro in Tanzania.

PATIENTS in Serbian hospitals will have a more pleasant environment, after an official government ruling which bans health workers from grumpiness and rudeness.

The health ministry's website listed the new regulations, which also ban gossiping and the wearing of mini-skirts, as well as outlawing the common practice of being bribed for better treatment.

"There needs to be ground rules for decency," said a ministry spokesman.

A STUDENT who swallowed his front door key to stop friends making him go home because he was drunk claims he has no memory of the incident.

However waking up on a sofa the next morning he felt unwell and was advised to go to hospital, where an X-ray revealed the key moving through his alimentary tract.

Fortunately he "let nature take its course" and the key emerged naturally the next day, meaning keyhole surgery wasn't required.

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
