MSD md retires

WILL Delaat has announced his retirement from Merck Sharp & Dohme after 11 years as the company's managing director.

He'll also resign his directorship of Medicines Australia but will continue as its independent nonvoting chairman. AN INVESTIGATION into the US pharmacy industry has found evidence that corporate policies and pressure on pharmacists are leading to dispensing errors.

The probe by major US daily newspaper *USA Today* looked at policies and alleged errors at the two biggest pharmacy chains in the USA - Walgreens and CVS.

Together the companies fill nearly a third of all retail prescriptions, and the study correlated lawsuits and pharmacy board disciplinary actions.

Common factors cited included "too many prescriptions, too few pharmacists" which required pharmacists to work long shifts with few breaks.

A demand from consumers for fast dispensing was also a problem with Walgreens guidelines suggesting that two minutes is all that is required to fill a script including counselling time. Walgreens also pays pharmacy managers and pharmacists bonuses based on increases in prescription volume.

Pressure leads to errors

State records showed citations of both companies for failing to offer or provide counselling.

Walgreens and CVS both defended their operations, claiming that "no pharmacist ever has to fill a single prescription more during the workday than they feel is safe."

TGA listings

THE Therapeutic Goods Authority has issued two listing notices for new substances to be included in the Australian Register of Therapeutic Goods.

The listings cover pastes, powders or gels for dental hygiene containing sodium fluoride in concentrations of under 1000mg/kg, as well as oral preparations containing Euphausia superba oil.

The TGA also issued a draft compositional guideline for Euphausia superba oil, which is derived from Antarctic Krill.

There's also a project looking at the alignment of community pharmacy with the National Palliative Care Strategy, as well as another aiming to identify the primary health care role for pharmacy in assisting people with mild to moderate mental illness.

Baby brain research

BABIES' brains are helping Australian scientists understand the causes of diseases such as strokes and Alzheimer's.

Researchers at the Queensland Brain Institute have looked at what causes babies' brain cells to live or die.

They found it is the electrical signals that brain cells use to communicate with each other that keeps the cells alive, while unstimulated cells die.

The institute's Dr Elizabeth Coulson says the discovery is an important step in treatment for strokes and Alzheimer's.

"If you are using the parts of the body that are connected in the brain that have been damaged, for example after a stroke, then you may be able to stop some of the degenerative processes that happen in the long term in a stroke," she said.

DISPENSARY CORNER

MEDICAL certificates are very much in the news, with a sudden realisation in the media that under the new rules it's not just pharmacists and doctors who can issue them.

According to reports in Sunday newspapers yesterday the Workchoices laws allow any medical practitioner to issue medical certificates - including chiropractors, podiatrists, naturopaths and acupuncturists.

One story probably went a little far by also suggesting they could be issued by veterinarians.

A MAJOR fraud was uncovered in Italy last week with the arrest of a 70-year-old man as he drove his car.

When police officers stopped the man's vehicle during a routine traffic check he wasn't able to produce a driver's licence, and upon further investigation it was discovered that the man's medical records claimed he was completely blind.

It turns out he'd been pretending to be blind for more than 40 years in order to receive social security payments.

A CHANCE meeting has saved the life of a man in the UK, after the doctor who shook his hand diagnosed a rare condition.

36-year-old Mark Gurrieri was working at a restaurant when he greeted one of the patrons, local gp Dr Chris Britt.

Britt noticed Mr Gurrieri's spongy-feeling hand and large facial features, and recalled them as symptoms of a brain tumour called acromelagy.

Doctors removed the growth last month, with Britt saying "It's the sort of diagnosis you might make once in a career if you're lucky."
