HEALTHSCOPE has sold out of Symbion Health, ending its efforts to extract assets from its new owner, Primary Health Care.

After a 13 month takeover war, Healthscope yesterday gave up its 12% interest in Symbion, leaving Ed Bateman's Primary able to take full control of the firm.

Healthscope said it had terminated a share swap it held over the Symbion shares because it was no longer able to justify the cost of the stake and it wants to focus on other assets

The sale of the swaps to Goldman Sachs, its advisor, made a small net gain.

Healthscope is still interested in Symbion's pathology assets in Victoria and WA, but no deal has yet been made.

**MEANWHILE** Primary Health Care this morning extended its bid deadline to 11 Mar.

The deal was set to close today but with the Healthscope move Primary is now hoping to hit the 90% compulsory acquisition level.

As of yesterday Primary held 65.17% of its takeover target.

**Record Blackmores profit COMPLEMENTARY** products specialist Blackmores yesterday reported a net profit after tax of \$12.3m for the 6 mths to 31 Dec.

The figure was up 20.2% on the previous corresponding period, on sales up 6.7% to \$90.1m.

Blackmores cited healthy performances in both pharmacy and grocery channels in Australia, with successful launches of new products and infomercial-style TV advertising under the 'B your best' Health Update theme.

DUTCH prison research could indicate a new type of ADHD treatment.

Police in Rotterdam have just finished a study in which the scent of oranges was circulated into cells occupied by violent criminals.

During the four week trial they found the inmates were "calmer and more malleable" when the perfumes were used.

"It's amazing, fighting in the cells has been dramatically reduced and we are using ten per cent fewer sedation drugs," said the head of the police social services Herma Heester.

NON-SMOKERS are often disturbed by people lighting up, but a German man probably overreacted a bit this week.
