PHARMACIES are being reminded by the Australian Taxation Office that from 01 Jan cold and flu products containing paracetamol and phenylephrine labelled for use by people aged 12 and over are no longer GST free.

The move coincides with the downscheduling of the phenylephrine products, which were previously S2.

Now that the products are no longer restricted for sale under state or territory law, they don't meet the requirements of the GST act to be GST-free.

Pharmacies must update sales systems to ensure the change in GST classification, and any who experience problems are being advised to contact the Tax Office to discuss their specific issues.

Apotex alendronate

APOTEX has announced it's "clear to sell and promote alendronate" and expects an Apr PBS listing for the product.

Apotex alendronate will be one of the first to be launched under the Apotex branding, together with amlodipine which is also expected to be on the PBS in Apr.

NATIONAL Prescribing Service has urged health professionals to be aware of psychiatric symptoms which have been reported with the use of varenicline (Champix).

Patients should be monitored for behaviour and/or mood changes, according to an NPS RADAR review released today.

"Varenicline is a new drug in a new class of drugs, therefore some extra uncertainty exists about its safety profile," the review said.

The most common adverse effect noted in clinical trials was nausea, but patients also reported insomnia, abnormal dreams,

THE long-running Symbion takeover saga grinds on, with Primary this morning advising it now holds 36.03% of the firm.

Primary's offer, which has been rejected by the Symbion board, now closes at 7pm on 21 Jan 08.

PBS Jan update

THE Department of Health and Ageing has issued the updated Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme schedule from 01 Jan.

Key changes include the addition of medications which can be prescribed by optometrists as well as the new stop smoking medication varenicline.

Other additions include pemetrexed disodium (Alimta) for pleural mesothelioma and infant influenza vaccine Vaxigrip junior.

Upcoming deletions from the schedule include efavirenz capsule 200mg (Stocrin) from 01 Mar; oestradiol hemihydrate nasal spray 150ug (Aerodiol) from 01 Apr; and salmeterol xinfoate oral pressurised inhalation 25ug (Serevent) from 01 May.

NPS warns on Champix

The drug is thought to work by reducing craving and withdrawal symptoms from nicotine, with trials showing 23% of generally healthy, motivated smokers had quit smoking at one year compared to 15% for those using bupropion and 10% for subjects taking a placebo.

Champix was made available on the PBS from 01 Jan, with a subsidy available for one 12-week course per patient per year.

It must be prescribed as part of a comprehensive program which includes smoking-cessation support and counselling to maximise its effectiveness. See www.npsradar.org.au.
