THE Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee yesterday announced a positive recommendation for the PBS listing of GSK's breast cancer drug Tykerb (lapatinib).

The move follows considerable lobbying by breast cancer groups.

If the recommendation is accepted Tykerb would be listed as an authority required pharmaceutical benefit for use in combination with capecitabine, for the treatment of patients with advanced or metastatic breast cancer whose tumours overexrpess HER2 (ErbB2) and who have failed prior therapy including trastuzumab.

The PBAC said the decision was made "on the basis of a high, but acceptable cost effectiveness ratio".

Tykerb was originally rejected by the PBAC last Jul, and for some of the time since then the company had agreed to fund the treatment for some patients while the PBAC decision was made.

In Nov the committee again considered the medication, deferring its decision while requesting further information from GSK which has now been provided.

The government is now required to make a decision on funding the treatment on the PBS.

A NEW policy for the recognition of New Zealand registered pharmacists in Queensland has come into effect from 02 Jan.

arrangements registration is immediate, but with conditions which include 152 hours of supervised practice over at least four weeks.

NZ registrants must also successfully complete a written open book examination which may include forensic, ethics and calculations elements.

After the supervised practice and the assessment, the NZ pharmacist can make application to the Pharmacists Board of Queensland for the conditions to be removed from registration.

DAA for veterans

FROM 01 Mar pharmacies will be able to deliver free Dose Administration Aids to eligible veterans in Australia.

Under the new system, veterans will be identified as possibly benefiting from DAA use during a Home Medication Review, and if appropriate the patient's doctor may request an authority for a program trial.

This is done in the same way as other medical prescriptions, and will be for a period of time rather than a quantity.

Pharmacies can claim a \$10 per week fee for the service via the normal claiming process, with repeats available to extend the service for periods of six months.

At six monthly intervals a pharmacist may conduct a review and give feedback to the doctor.

This service, for which the doctor will need to request an authority, can be claimed as a Veteran's Six Monthly Review (VSMR) and can be claimed at the rate of \$100.
