QLD pharmacist suspended

A QUEENSLAND pharmacist is facing the Health Practitioners Tribunal for several alleged breaches of professional conduct.

Alistair Moodliar allegedly dispensed controlled and restricted medicines, on suspect prescriptions or without prescriptions, to 334 people in 2006.

He has been suspended since May under Section 59 of the Health Practitioners Act by the Pharmacy Board of Queensland.

It is also alleged that Moodliar deleted more than 1,000 records from the dispensing data of the Gold Coast pharmacy where he worked in an attempt to mislead authorities.

Drinking worse than drugs

BINGE drinking has become a bigger problem than drug abuse, according to doctors in Victoria, but mental health and obesity are still their two biggest health concerns.

Almost 1,800 doctors answered a Herald Sun poll to rate the state's health system.

They clearly identified mental health and obesity as the two areas most in need of greater attention, each attracting 27% of the vote.

Their next biggest concern was chronic illness (21%).

Over half of Victoria's doctors believe binge drinking is a bigger worry than drug abuse, calling for a radical overhaul of liquor licensing to improve public health.

They said the public had to take personal responsibility for many of the rising health threats.

appeared to reduce the risk of hip and any nonvertebral fractures by approximately 25%", he said.

Almost two million Australians suffer with osteporosis and require vitamin D supplementation.

"Providing adequate levels of vitamin D along with the patients osteoporosis treatment may help more people get the right intake", Professor Sambrook said.

Allergy sufferers at risk

MANY Australians who suffer severe allergic reactions may be placing themselves at risk by not carrying emergency medication with them, according to the Pfizer Australia Health Report.

The research says 7% of allergy sufferers experience anaphylaxis, and fewer than half of them carry emergency medication or have an anaphylaxis action plan.

Skewer hold-up

TWO men armed with a "pointy" metal object, possibly a skewer, robbed an Adelaide pharmacy on Monday night.

They entered the Holden Hill pharmacy about 9pm and demanded drugs from the staff.

The men, one wearing a mask, escaped with cash and a quantity of medicines.

Police are seeking information from the public.

Salt labelling issues

AUSTRALIANS are concerned about how much salt they consume but most have no idea how to work out the sodium content in foods, a survey shows.

Public health researchers are calling for an overhaul of Australia's food labelling system in light of findings that most shoppers are confused by the nutrition information panels.

The survey of more than 1,000 people showed that 75% were worried about the amount of salt in their diet.

Less than a quarter said they checked labels for salt content.
