TGC minutes

THE TGA has released the minutes of the meeting of the Therapeutic Goods Committee held on 29 Apr, with a range of reports and recommendations.

One matter considered was the expansion of the default standard to include pharmacopoeias other than the British Pharmacopoeia.

The committee recommended that the TGA progress changes to legislation to adopt the British Pharmacopoeia, the European Pharmacopoeia and the United States Pharmacopoeia-national formulary as equal default standards for medicines and other therapeutic goods that are not medical devices.

Suspect medicine

A HUMAN antibody has reportedly killed six people in China after they were injected with immunoglobulin.

The company making the drugs, Jiangxi Boya Bio-Pharmaceutical Co., has been ordered to stop selling the drugs.

The firm has shipped 9,000 doses of the same batch to hospitals around China, of which 3,192 had been used without any problems.

The remainder have been recalled, and it is not clear if the drugs in question were also used for treating patients outside of China.

Health data storage

AN Australian company has come up with a way for travellers to ensure that their health information can easily be accessed if there's a problem while they're away.

The free online service at www.mivitals.com allows people to securely store all their health details - such as blood group, medical reports, test results and photos - organised into logical sections such as Emergency, Allergies, Injuries, Immunisations and Lifestyle.

Family members can be grouped together under a single log-in and other travel info such as passport details and emergency contacts can also be included on the site.

Founder of the site Jude Foster is a registered nurse who previously developed Wrap Around Kids, a program that helps parents share information on their children's medical needs with health professionals.

Get up and walk

DISPENSING with the office chair could deliver the same health benefits as a brisk 100-minute walk, a Melbourne public health expert says.

Associate Professor David Dunstan is on a crusade to rid offices of chairs and improve the health and expanding waistlines of Australians.

The VicHealth research fellow calculates standing at a desk for eight hours uses almost twice as much energy as sitting to do the same job - equating to 100 minutes of pounding the pavement for the average 85kg male and 70kg female office worker.

"It doesn't mean standing at your desk is a substitute for daily exercise," Professor Dunstan said.

"Sitting for long periods, regardless of how much exercise you do, increases risk factors for cardiovascular disease, type 2 diabetes and obesity," he said.

HERE'S why people need to take vitamin supplements.

A survey in the UK has found that Britons are eating less and less oranges - mainly because they're too busy to peel them during their lunch breaks.

Orange consumption is down for the third year in a row - but the decline is apparently offset by a rise in sales of other fruit incl mandarins and tangerines which are easier to eat.

SCIENTISTS in the UK claim that laboratory-grown hair cells could be the answer to baldness.

In a trial of "follicular cell implantation" small amounts of healthy cells were multiplied in test tubes then re-injected into bald areas of patients.

Six months after treatment 11 out of 19 experimental subjects had grown new hair.
