A NATIONWIDE screening service for scleroderma, a rare and incurable autoimmune disorder, has been established across Australia.


Dr Susanna Proudman, Senior Consultant Rheumatologist, Royal Adelaide Hospital said the development places Australia at the cutting edge of scleroderma management, with a multi-system approach involving a variety of specialists who have set up the network of screening centres.

Patients are rallying together to raise awareness about the disease during Scleroderma Awareness Month.

NEW research shows a 10 per cent lowering of 'bad' LDL cholesterol could save 3,000 Australian lives a year.

The research, conducted by The George Institute for International Health on behalf of Unilever Australasia, indicated that even small reductions in cholesterol can substantially reduce heart attacks and strokes, irrespective of a patient's age, sex or initial cholesterol level.

Cannabis helps memory loss

NEW cannabis-based treatments may improve memory loss in Alzheimer's sufferers.

Tests show that one of the 400 compounds in the drug can significantly slow memory problems caused by the disease.

Scientists yesterday revealed their findings in London at a symposium of cannabis experts hosted by the Royal Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain.

They have called for human trials after researchers from Israel and Spain successfully conducted tests on mice.

Asthma treatment study released


PATIENTS with very mild or well-controlled asthma have significantly better day-to-day lung function when treated with regular low-dose ICS, according to a Sydney study.

The 11-month study compared the effects of inhaled corticosteroids (ICS) and placebo on asthma control in mild asthmatics

The results raise questions about the current emphasis in asthma treatment which is based largely on controlling symptoms, and which does not advocate ICS treatment for patients with symptoms two days a week or less.

Results also indicated that a "ceiling" effect for lung function does not exist.

Even patients whose lung function is over 90% of predicted normal value may have room to further improve their personal best with treatment, say researchers at the Woolcock Institute of Medical Research.
