ADRAC issues colchicine warning

THE TGA's Adverse Drug Reactions Advisory Committee has today issued its latest bulletin, including a reiteration of previous warnings about fatal interactions and reactions with colchicine, used to treat acute gout.

ADRAC said colchicine is best avoided if patients are taking drugs that inhibit CYP3A4 or have renal or hepatic impairment.

The bulletin also has a reminder of tendon disorders associated with the use of floroquinolone antibiotics, as well as reports of hyponatraemia in association with various medicines - see the bulletin at www.tga.gov.au.

\$1.9m loss for HIP parent API reaffirms

HEALTH Corporation, the listed parent company of franchise group Health Information Pharmacy, today revealed a loss of \$1.89m for the year to 30 Jun.

The company said that after a major restructure of its operations it "continues to transition into profitability," with the departure from the group of "several non complying stores."

The figures also show a provision for bad debts of \$570,000, including impaired trade receivables and non-repayment of loans.

Knife hold-ups

A PHARMACIST was held up at knifepoint on Sunday afternoon by a barefoot man demanding cash and drugs.

The Amcal Day and Night Chemist in a busy street in Cairns, was robbed at about 2.20pm.

The man, wearing shorts, t-shirt, a large hat and no shoes, pulled out a knife and demanded the pharmacy's safes be opened.

He was given money and drugs by the pharmacist and pharmacy assistant before he escaped.

Police praised the staff for following correct procedures.

MEANWHILE in Sydney's southwest a knife was also used to threaten a pharmacist working in a shopping centre in West Hoxton last night.

Nobody was injured in the robbery, with the assailant fleeing the store with a small amount of cash and prescription medication.

Police are looking for a man described as being 18-20 years old, of Middle Eastern appearance and of medium build.

API reaffirms earnings guidance

AUSTRALIAN Pharmaceutical Industries yesterday issued a statement refuting a *Financial Review* report that it's facing a 'black hole' due to systemic issues, citing a publication by investment bank UBS.

API said it hadn't been consulted before the publication of the article and denied that it had encountered any problems.

The company reaffirmed previous financial guidance which estimated earnings before interest and tax of \$49-\$50m.

API said it's "continuing to make progress in building its base in pharmaceutical wholesaling and in growing its Priceline brand."
