UK Viagra King case GSK cuts direct program

A MAN dubbed Britain's "King of Viagra" has been given a stiff prison sentence after a major investigation into the supply of counterfeit medicines in the UK.

The UK Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency said Dr George Patino (aka Giorgio Giovanni Paticciano) and co-conspirators sold fake Viagra in the UK and world wide over a 9 month period in 2005

During that period he received numerous complaints from buyers, including one claiming that "the product was coated with blue paint that was coming off the tablet "

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He's been sentenced to a minimum 3 years in prison.

GLAXOSMITHKLINE this morning announced the closure of its Real Plus scheme which distributed its products directly to more than 2000 pharmacies across Australia.

The program is a victim of the PBS reforms, with GSK saying it's "reviewed its current distribution strategy and concluded that it is no longer viable" for Real Plus to continue following the introduction of the Community Services Obligation funding pool and the statutory price cuts.

The closure is effective 01 Nov, after which time the company said pharmacies will have to order GSK products through their preferred wholesaler.

Govt eating push

THE Health Department has announced that it will develop a comprehensive, coordinated national approach to eating disorders incl bulimia and anorexia nervosa, which has the highest mortality rate of any psychiatric illness.

An investment of \$500,000 will see a new National Eating Disorders Collaboration formed comprising experts in research, education, health promotion as well as the media, with possible measures to include a voluntary code of conduct for the media and fashion industries.

Mirixa Guild deal

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THE Pharmacy Guild has signed a new technology licensing and business consulting agreement with US firm Mirixa which will pave the way for the deployment of a web-based patient care system called MirixaPro in pharmacies across Australia.

The pact was announced overnight at the US National Community Pharmacists Association convention in Florida.

Guild president Kos Sclavos said the technology would help boost patient compliance, giving the Guild "the ability to quickly introduce programs that improve medication adherence and healthcare outcomes in Australia "

MirixaPro is used in more than 46,000 pharmacies across the USA to deliver patient care services.

The Guild will form a new venture called Mirixa Australia to deliver "programs that harness the power of the pharmacistpatient relationship."



HERE'S a unique use for soiled baby nappies.

Ukrainian boxing champion Vitali Klitschko has revealed that he used his son's wet diapers to stop his fists from swelling after winning his recent WBC heavyweight title fight against Nigeria's Samuel Peter.

"Baby wee is good because it's pure, doesn't contain toxins and doesn't smell," he said, adding that he got the idea from his grandmother.

"I wrap nappies filled with my three-year-old-son Max's wee around my fists.

"The nappies hold the liquid and the swelling stays down."

USING the internet can be very healthy for your brain, according to research published this week in the American Journal of Geriatric Psychiatry.

The Los Angeles scientists found that searching the internet by middle-aged and older people stimulated centres in the brain that control decisionmaking and complex reasoning.

Lead researcher Professor Gary Small said "A simple, everyday task like searching the web appears to enhance brain circuitry in older adults."

US Alzheimer's Research Trust ceo Rebecca Wood hailed the findings which she said "add to previous research suggesting that middle-aged and older people can reduce their risk of dementia by taking part in regular mentally stimulating activities.

"Older web users - 'silver surfers' - are doing precisely this," she added.

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
