New Professional Pharmacy Services

The new Professional Pharmacy Services, funded by the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing under the Better Community Health Initiative of the Fourth Community Pharmacy Agreement, continue to gain momentum.

Managed by the Pharmacy Guild of Australia, the programs are starting to achieve a number of important milestones.

The Dose Administration Aids (DAA) Program has achieved 82 per cent registrations, with 2800 of those pharmacies having now provided their baseline data.

That means there are a lot of registered pharmacies that are still due to provide baseline date, which they will need to do to continue participating in and benefiting from the program.

The Patient Medication Profile (PMP) Program, meanwhile, has seen 45 per cent of pharmacies register with 2100 of those having already provided the baseline data.

A further 1700 participants have also submitted their first biannual data report.

It is NOT too late to register for either of these programs!

Last but not least, the Guild has so far received 400 applications for the Diabetes Pilot Program: Diabetes **Medication Assistance Service** (DMAS).

Symbion Consumer sales will be consolidated by sanofi-aventis as from September 1, 2008.

Sept PBS listings

NEW listings on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme from this month include the liquid form of clarithromycin for the treatment of pertussis and atypical Mycobacterium infections, and an additional brand of blood glucose tests strips for diabetics.

The listing of liquid clarithromycin (Klacid) will offer patients more choice of treatment for whooping cough and infections caused by mycobacteria, particularly for those who have difficulty swallowing tablets.

On-Call Plus test strips will offer more options to people with type 1 and type 2 diabetes.

SLIP me some skin!

A unique artwork has just changed hands for a whopping \$258,000 and will be shown in Singapore and Shanghai starting from next week.

The image of the Virgin Mary is remarkable because it's actually a tattoo on the back of Swiss man Tim Steiner, who sold the art with the stipulation that it only go "on display" three times a year.

As well as being restricted to the thrice-yearly exhibition, the other stipulation is that the tattoo can be removed from Steiner's skin when he dies and handed to its owner.

AN OBESITY crisis has emerged in the British police force, with the finding that some officers are so hefty that they can only transport one suspect at a time in their vehicles.

A recent survey found that some cars carrying two generously built policemen are within 120kg of legal weight limits, meaning that if they had to arrest two people they would have to call for another vehicle.

HOT wax sprayed everywhere in Newcastle last night after a beauty salon caught fire.

Fire brigade officials said the blaze broke out at about 8.40pm at The Studio Skin and Body Care shop and suspect that an electrical fault overheated two pots of wax.

A subsequent explosion of other chemicals knocked the building off its foundations and could be felt blocks away.
