THE Pharmacy Guild of Australia has announced the 35 lucky recipients of this year's Rural and Remote Pharmacy Scholarships.

The scholarship provide each student with up to \$40,000 during their time at university, with Guild President Kos Sclavos saying the program also encourages the holders to pursue a pharmacy career in rural or remote Australia after graduation.

\$10,000 a year is provided each year for up to four years of study to help cover the costs associated with studying away from home in either undergraduate or graduate pharmacy courses.

Participants also take part in a mentor program, usually in partnership with an existing rural pharmacist, which aims to reinforce the students' ties to rural and regional Australia.

"The mentoring program not only helps the students develop a learning plan, but it provides support to students outside of the university environment.

"It's an important tool for supporting students who have come from rural and remote areas and are studying away from their family support base," Sclavos said.

The program is managed by the Guild and funded by the Health Department in recognition of the key role that pharmacists play in maintaining the health of all Australians.

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THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia has backed other industry players in opposing proposals by the National Drugs and Poisons Schedule Committee to impose new restrictions on products containing codeine (PD Thu).

PSA President, Warwick Plunkett, said the NDPSC plans "do not seem to be evidence based, but rather rely on anecdotal material to support moves for the package restrictions and the rescheduling

"There does not seem to be supporting evidence of just what proportion of illicit use there is to legitimate use to justify these strong measures," he said.

While the PSA fully supports moves to stop the illicit use of such products, the NDPSC proposals "would greatly disadvantage the vast majority of codeine users who used the products for legitimate therapeutic purposes," Plunkett

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PSA slams codeine plan

"Alerting the public and the pharmacy profession to the problem...would be a better course of action," Plunkett said.

"Pharmacy has the mechanisms in place to facilitate such a campaign and these include the resources of PSA's Pharmacy Self Care program...as well as an extension of Project STOP.

"To penalise most Australians for the activities of a few is an unnecessary over-reaction," he said.

ASMI sponsors Life

THE Australian Self-Medication Industry is the new major sponsor of the 'Mind Your Medicine' program being offered by Life Education to primary school students across Australia.

The program aims to boost health literacy and complements other Life Education offerings which are delivered by 120 full-time and part-time educators using a national network of mobile classrooms.

Over 750,000 students participate in the programs each year, with mascot 'Healthy Harold' now delivering messages about smoking, alcohol and illicit drugs to school children for 30 years.

Mind Your Medicine is for primary students in their fourth and fifth years of school, giving them knowledge about medicines and the consequence of their misuse.

It also recognises the role that medicines play in treating illness and disease, and in maintaining good health.

ASMI executive director Juliet Seifert said: "By reaching people during childhood, we are able to instil sound knowledge and good practice with medicines that will carry through to their adult life."



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THE next time a patient complains with an inexplicable allergy, ask them about whether they have any new furniture.

That's the recommendation of a report in this month's Allergy journal, which cites a "toxic fungicide in imported furniture" for a big jump in allergic reactions around the world.

Chronic dermatitis, skin burns, breathing difficulties and eve irrirtation are symptoms of the allergy which has been particularly associated with new leather sofas imported from China.

Apparently the couches contain sachets of dimethyl fumarate, which when warmed by body heat causes a toxic vapour to be emitted.

The problem is most severe in the UK where 15 furniture retailers sold the couches, and an expected multi-million dollar compensation bill for victims, some of whom were hospitalised as a result.

Alexei Roskov says he doesn't know why he leapt the first time, but it had something to do with the three bottles of vodka which he had drunk in succession.
