### US MS approval

THE US Food and Drug Administration has given approval to Novartis' Extavia (interferon beta-1b) for the treatment of relapsing forms of multiple sclerosis, to reduce the frequency of clinical exacerbations.

Extavia will be available along with a support program including a nurse helpline, one-on-one injection training and reimbursement support services, with patients having an autoinjector available to them from Novartis.

### **Prebiotic push**

A RESEARCHER from the Netherlands is in Australia this week to share his findings with healthcare professionals at a series of seminars supported by formula maker Nutricia.

Professor Johan Garssen, who's Professor of Immunology from Danone Research and Utrecht University, said that prebiotic oligosaccharides are "key to developing a healthy immune system and reducing rates of allergies."

He said that oligosaccharides are contained naturally in breast milk yet another reason why breast is best for babies.

However his findings also have implications for non-breastfed infants, with only minor traces of oligosaccharides found in cow's milk

Trials of the use of prebiotic oligosaccharides have found a change in the allergic profile of atrisk babies, showing a significant effect on atopic dermatitis.

Nutricia's Karicare Gold+ formulas contain these compounds, with the company now able to promote the products following an amendment to the Food Standards Code which gave express permission for oligosaccharide mixtures (insulin derived substances and galacto-oligosaccharides) to be used in foods.

### TGACC correction

**THE** Therapeutic Goods Advertising Code Council has advised a change of presenters for its upcoming national series of seminars (**PD** yesterday).

As Catherine Brunskill has now left ASMI, the presenter for Adelaide, Perth, Sydney and Melbourne will be Jane Parker from the Australia Self Medication Industry, while in Brisbane it will be Ruben Jones from the

### Put some sunnies on that child!

A SURVEY carried out in the UK by the College of Optometrists has warned that 75% of parents are risking their children's eyesight by exposing them to bright sunlight without appropriate protection.

The poll of 2000 people found that almost 33% didn't believe that sunglasses were necessary for children, and of those who did almost half put "price before protection", while only about 25% bought sunglasses from a trusted brand, according to the BBC.

### Mircera approval

**THE** Therapeutic Goods Administration has approved Roche's MIRCERA (methoxy polyethylene glycol-epoetin beta) for the treatment of anaemia associated with chronic kidney disease

It's the first medication to offer once monthly maintenance dosing across different patient groups, with the potential to significantly simplify the management of anaemia associated with CKD.

Renal anaemia affects 60-80% of patients with chronic kidney disease and is strongly associated with increased morbidity and mortality.

### WA thief sought

POLICE in Western Australia have called for assistance to help identify a man wanted in connection with a robbery of a pharmacy in Geraldton over the weekend.

The man wore a stocking over his head when he entered the chemist in Durlacher Street on Saturday morning, demanding drugs and threatening customers and staff with a metal picket, according to a News Limited report.

He was reportedly given some drugs from the pharmacy's safe before fleeing, with police asking anyone with more information to contact them on 1800 333 000.
