Step forward for e-Health

DRAFT legislation released by the federal government today is being claimed as an "important step forward" for the development of a secure electronic health system in

If enacted the legislation would create a unique healthcare number for health care providers and consumers, with the govt saying the identifiers "will provide a new level of confidence and accuracy when communicating patient information across and between private and government healthcare providers."

The identifier service will be initially operated by Medicare Australia, which will automatically allocate a number to every Australian who currently has a Medicare Card or a Dept of Veterans' Affairs treatment card. It's planned that the healthcare

identifiers will be implemented by mid-2010 if passed by Parliament, with the draft legislation following "comprehensive consultations with stakeholders" including all of the states and territories.

Comments on the exposure draft bill are due by 07 Jan 2010 - see health.gov.au/ehealth/consultation.

Old board closure

THE Qld Office of Health Practitioner Registration Boards has advised it will close at 12 noon on Thu 24 Dec and reopen at 9am on Mon 04 Jan 2010.

Clomephine price up

THE Health Department has advised that from 01 Jan the Commonwealth Price to Pharmacist for the PBS-listed drug clomiphene tablet 50mg will increase to \$25.72, up from \$23.20.

The department said the change is outside of the normal price change points of 01 Apr, 01 Aug and 01 Dec each year, and is due to a change in the number of clomiphene brands available on the PBS from 01 Jan 2010.

Vit D - diabetes link

A NEW Zealand researcher has uncovered a link between vitamin D and combating insulin resistance.

Pamela Von Hurst, nutrition lecturer at the Institute of Food, Nutrition and Human Health in Albany, studied 235 insulin resistant South Asian women, from Pakistan, India and Sri Lanka aged 20yrs and over, and found that after they took vitamin D supplements the womens' condition improved significantly.

The study also showed that vitamin D produced a marked increase in bone strength in the study's older participants

Caesars stabilised

FOR the first time in over a decade, the rate of Australian women undergoing caesarean births has not 'markedly' increased, according to the latest report released by the Australian Institure of Health and Welfare.

The report, titled "Australian mothers and babies 2007", found that between 2006-07 there was only a 0.1% rise in caesarean births.

The results also showed the rate of primary caesarean births was 22% higher for first time mothers (32%) than for mothers who had previously given birth (12%).

CSL gum disease vaccine

CSL LIMITED today confirmed that ti's developing a new vaccine to treat severe gum disease, in collaboration with Sanofi Pasteur.

CSL has signed an agreement with Sanofi to fund a program for the further development of the vaccine, based on candidate antigens identified through more than a decade of research by CSL and scientists from the University of Melbourne, in the Cooperative Research Centre (CRC) for Oral Health Science

Periodontitis is a serious disease and dentists face a major challenge in treating it, because most people will not know they have the disease until it's too late and the infection has progressed to advanced stages," said ceo of the CRC and the head of the Dental School at the University of Melbourne.

The new vaccine approach targets the so-called "ringleader" of a group of pathogenic bacteria which cause periodontitis, called Porphyromonas gingivalis.

Prof Reynolds said the CRC was very excited about the novel approach to the disease which will potentially "provide dentists and patients with a specific treatment

which prevents disease progression, rather than managing its symptoms and damaging consequences."

The candidate vaccines are being trialled in mouse models of periodontal disease and will progress to clinical trials following a positive response.

If the program succeeds Sanofi Pasteur has an option for an exclusive worldwide license to commercialise the products.

Panvax fact sheet

THE Pharmacy Guild has issued a new fact sheet on the Panvax H1N1 vaccine, following the recent approval of Panvax for children aged 6 months and older (PD 04 Dec).

"As front line health professionals, members and staff are likely to receive enquiries from customers regarding the vaccination program," the Guild said, confirming that consumer brochures and posters have been sent to all pharmacies nationally for distribution to customers.

So far Wang has off-loaded 500 pairs of socks, and plans to vastly expand his empire.

AN INDONESIAN labourer's bid to be named the world's tallest man has fallen short, after officials judged his height to be five centimetres less than the current record holder, Turkish man Sultan Kosen.

Previous hospital records had stated Suparwono's height at 2.71 metres-24 centimetres taller than Kosen's 2.47 metres.

However official measurements taken by the Indonesian Museum of Records have recently put paid to that claim, clocking Suparwono in at a mere 2.42m.

The officials measured Suparwono both lying down and standing up, to be doubly sure of the results.

The figures, whilst disappointing for Suparwono, have placed him as the tallest man in indonesia.




