Liver drug listed

A NEW treatment for unresectable hepatocellular carcinoma (HCC), Nexavar (sorafenib tosylate), will be available on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme from 01 February.

Nexavar is the only systemic treatment proven to significantly improve overall survival in advanced HCC2, a type of primary liver cancer, and the first to be registered by the Therapeutic Goods Administration for the treatment of advanced HCC.

Nexavar is to be administered as an initial treatment of advanced HCC in a patient with a WHO performance status of 2 or less and Child Pugh class A1.

Flu vaccine spray

ASTRAZENECA has applied to market a nasal spray influenza vaccine in Europe.

The new drug application is based on data from 73 studies conducted in 38 countries.

The spray is already marketed in the United States as FluMist and was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in 2003.

"We are hopeful that the future availability and product characteristics of this novel nasal spray influenza vaccine will contribute to an increase in vaccination rates and reduce the spread of influenza around the world," said Dr Alex Zukiwski, chief medical officer of MedImmune, a subsidiary of AstraZeneca.

PBS subsidy for nurses?

PRESCRIPTIONS written by nurse practitioners at a chain of private clinics would qualify for Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme subsidies, if a new proposal is approved by the Federal Government.

The Revive Clinic, which has opened a nurse-run clinic in Perth and has plans for 20 more nationwide, proposed the pilot scheme in its submission to the Preventative Health Taskforce and has also applied for permission for its consultations to be covered by Medicare.

Under WA law, nurses at the clinic can treat patients and prescribe S4 drugs for minor conditions, such as coughs, cold, flu, nausea, ear infections and bladder infections.

GE goat drug

THE US Food and Drug Administration has held its firstever advisory committee meeting on a product from a genetically engineered animal.

The anti-clotting drug, made from the milk of GE goats, has been deemed safe and effective by the FDA.

ATryn, developed by GTC Biotherapeutics, is already approved for use in Europe for patients with a rare hereditary disorder that makes them vulnerable to life-threatening blood clots.



Sleep for your heart

ONE extra hour of sleep can cut the five-year risk of coronary artery calcification by 33%, according to new research.

The five-year study used wrist monitors, rather than selfreporting, to test 500 healthy, middle-aged Americans.

The benefits of sleep remained even after adjusting for age, smoking and other cardiac risk factors.
