St John's wort

A COCHRANE review has found some extracts of St John's wort are as effective for major depression as standard antidepressants, but with fewer side-effects.

The review examined almost 5,500 people with major depression who participated in 29 double-blind randomised controlled trials.

In nine large trials, the combined response rate ratio for St John's wort extracts compared with placebo was 1.28; smaller trials showed less response than placebo; and when compared to antidepressants, it had the same response rate.

Food addictions

FOODS that have a high glycaemic index (GI) tend to be more addictive than low-GI foods, suggests new research from NZ.

The research team said the increased blood-sugar levels of these foods stimulate the areas of the brain that are known to be linked to other addictions, such as smoking.

GENERIC medicine messages will target Chinese and Italian communities in the third phase of the National Prescribing Service's consumer campaign.

From February, community service announcements and interviews with health professionals will be broadcast in Cantonese, Mandarin and Italian on SBS and foreign-language radio stations across Australia.

Printed in-language resources are also being developed in partnership with the Federation of Ethnic Communities' Councils of Australia and will be available in March

FECCA director Peter van Vliet said that apart from language barriers, seniors from other cultures often struggled with "low levels of cultural competency of health systems or the experience of navigating unfamiliar medicines systems."

NPS Deputy CEO, Karen Kaye said these people would be encouraged to speak to their

pharmacist about generic medicines.

Generic ads target race

"We know that seniors from communities who speak languages other than English are particularly inclined to listen and consider medicines information from their doctors and pharmacists."

"Language barriers should not prevent people from understanding and having access to information about medicines," she said.

Pharmacists should also be aware that there may be difficulties with the direct translation of "generic" for some languages; for example, the Italian translation of "generic medicine" could be understood as being any medicine that is not Prescription Only.

Pharmacies needing translation services can call the Department of Immigration and Citizenship's free translation and interpreting service on 131 450.

Research grants

APPLICATIONS are being sought for grants through the Pharmacy Research Trust of NSW for 2009.

Project grants can be sought under two categories - research and seed funding and may include requests for research maintenance/ personnel or scholarships for post-graduate students.

Seed funding is available for new investigators and researchers of fewer than three years standing, and the projects should be capable of leading towards sufficient results to enable subsequent applications for funding to larger granting bodies.

Research awards may be granted up to \$20,000 a year for research projects and \$19,000 a year for post-graduate scholarships (three years for a PhD or two years for Masters).
