Changes at Blooms

Keep them rolling

MEALS on Wheels services throughout Queensland received a welcome boost yesterday, with the Dep't of Health and Ageing announcing over \$5 million of additional funding.

Each day Meals on Wheels in Old delivers over 10,000 meals to the frail, aged or disabled.

The new funding package consists of \$3.4 million from the Federal Gov't and \$1.8 million from the State Gov't.

The money will subsidise 147 delivery services across the state.

Spine manipulation

THE Chiropractors' Association of Australia has called for tougher restrictions on doctors and other health professionals performing spinal manipulations.

In a submission to the Gov't's National Accreditation and Registration Scheme, lodged on 10 Jul, the CAA argued that other health professionals do not have the same level of competence as chiropractors, who have to undergo five years of university education.

The said manipulation should be restricted to them unless doctors

Community Pharmacy Agreement. Geoff March, president of the Pharmacists Division of APESMA, has encouraged people to take part.

"This is an opportunity for employee community pharmacists to have their say," he said.

"Based on the input received, briefing papers will be prepared and presented to Government.

"It will only take a few minutes of vour time, but they are an important few minutes in terms of the future direction of the profession."

March said that while the Guild represents the interests of employer pharmacists, it is important "to ensure that employee pharmacists are able to present their views on issues that are important to them."

Method to diagnose overtraining

RESEARCHERS at Utrecht University in the Netherlands have developed a test to diagnose the stress-related illness 'overtraining syndrome' in horses, creating the possibility of improved treatment for comparable stress related syndromes in humans.

Until now, no diagnostic test was available for overtraining syndrome, which entails reduced performance despite the same or increased levels of training

However the new research found the disease could be diagnosed in horses by measuring nocturnal growth hormone secretion.

Alzheimer's remains under-diagnosed

A NEW study released this week has shown that two thirds of physicians in the UK, France, Italy, Spain and Germany agree that Alzheimer's Disease is underdiagnosed and under-treated.

Dubbed 'Important Perspectives on Alzheimer's Care and Treatment,' or IMPACT, the study found that many physicians feel the poor diagnosis record for the disease is the result of physician uncertainty in discussing the early stages, family tendency to ignore the early symptoms, an apathetic attitude toward diagnosis because there are no effective treatments and doctor reluctance to deliver bad news.

They also agreed that there is a need for increased awareness of the early symptoms.

The global study was sponsored by Eisai and Pfizer Inc.

Sanofi swine flu order

SANOFI Pasteur, the vaccines division of sanofi-aventis, said yesterday that it has received an order from the French Ministry of Health to produce a vaccine for the novel A(H1N1) influenza virus.

The order is for 28 million doses with an option for 28 million more.

The vaccine should be ready in four-six months.

Anonymous millions

THE Concordia University Wisconsin said yesterday that it had received a fourth anonymous donation of US\$1 million for its new School of Pharmacy, which is set to open in 2010.



THE ACCC has called for submissions on Edition 16 of the Medicines Australia Code of Conduct by 29 Jul.

MA members adopted the new code last month, but it only becomes effective when the ACCC makes a final determination late this year.

Gilead/J&J HIV deal

DRUG manufacturers Gilead Sciences and Johnson & Johnson have made a deal to develop a new once-daily pill for treating HIV.

The deal is not unexpected, but it is big news for Gilead, who will essentially be getting an experimental J&J drug at a discount to the retail price, said analysts.

The new HIV treatment would contain J&J's experimental drug and Gilead's Truvada pill.

A Victorian study has found that children who play video games have poorer physical and psychological health than those who spend time on the computer.

Published in Academic Pediatrics, the study says that surfing the net might boost mental health and participation in social networks.

IT'S lenses for leopards!

A German company has produced a range of contact lenses for animals suffering from catarachts, and now the idea is catching on.

Launched last year, S&V Technologies has already created acrylic intraocular lenses for animals including lions, giraffes, tigers and bears.

Clients have included a sea lion in San Diego, who had trouble performing tricks due to severely blurred vision; a kangaroo at an Australian nature park that that was completely blind until it received the lenses; and a visually impaired lioness in Romania.

Apparently the company turns over millions of dollars worth of business a year, with each procedure costing thousands.

ASHES to Anthrax!

A mysterious powder that set off an anthrax scare when it arrived at the US Embassy in Rome last week has turned out to be the ashes of the Texan sender's wife.

The parcel of ashes prompted an evacuation of the building while it was whisked away for analysis.

The envelope also contained a letter explaining where the ashes came from and asking embassy staff to scatter them in the city as the couple had once spent a nice holiday there.

Similar parcels were apparently sent to US embassies in London, Paris and Istanbul.
