This workshop is supported by the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing as part of the Fourth Community Pharmacy Agreement. DR Ken Harvey has responded to the Complementary Healthcare Council's assertions about ongoing complementary medicine regulation reform (*PD* yesterday), saying that despite the process, "promotion by Australian sponsors of complementary medicines regularly breaches the Therapeutic Goods Advertising Code with impunity."

Harvey said that the "process" started in 2003 and was aborted in 2007 with the abandonment of the proposed Australia New Zealand Therapeutic Products

Sydney Uni asthma research grants

THE NSW Asthma Foundation has awarded researchers from the Faculty of Pharmacy at the University of Sydney funding for two projects.

Dr Maria Sukkar was awarded a \$50,000 Sustainability Research Grant to investigate the processes that lead to abnormal airway muscle function in asthmatics, while Dr Margaret Hughes, Professor Carol Armour and Dr Brian Oliver received a \$25,000 Research Support Grant for their project on corticosteroids, mast cells, airway smooth muscle and remodelling in asthma.

Dr Hughes said the grants would "enables us to test new innovative ideas in asthma therapies."

Harvey also said that the TGA doesn't routinely evaluate evidence to support the claims made by sponsors of complementary medicines, "and hence the suggestion by CHOICE and others for an opt-in, independent evaluation system."

He said that it's his

understanding that such a concept was first raised in 2003 by the Expert Committee on Complementary Medicines in the Health System.

"Six years later, with no action from the TGA, some people are proposing to get on with the job!" he concluded.

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Osteoporosis alert

PHARMACY can play a key role in ensuring patients are diagnosed and treated for osteoporosis, which is currently costing the Australian health system a staggering \$1m every hour.

That was the message from a briefing this morning by two eminent osteoporosis experts.

Professor John Eisman of the Bone and Mineral Research Program at the Garvan Institute said the condition was significantly under-diagnosed, with both men and women susceptible to fractures which can really make life miserable.

Any older pharmacy clients who present with broken bones should be urged to see their doctor for a bone mineral density test, with vitamin D supplements also a key aid to bone health. CORUM Health Services has today endorsed the eRx Script Exchange electronic prescribing model developed by Fred Health.

Vaccinate kids against influenza

PHARMACISTS were today urged to speak with their customers about the benefits of having their children vaccinated against influenza this winter.

Australian experts in influenza and paediatrics warned that an increasing body of evidence is demonstrating the serious illness that influenza can cause in children under five years of age.

John Jackson, PSA board member and member of the Influenza Specialist Group, explained that many parents remain unaware that influenza hospitalisation rates are highest among children aged under five.

"Pharmacists are an important source of health information and are regularly consulted on child health matters by their customers," Mr Jackson said.

"The importance of influenza vaccination should be discussed not only with elderly Australians and those with 'at-risk' conditions, but also with customers of young children.

"This is especially important,

given that children younger than five years old are more likely than any other age group to require a GP visit or hospitalisation as a result of flu."

Dr Jim Buttery, Murdoch Children's Research Institute and Infectious Diseases Unit, Royal Children's Hospital Melbourne, said nearly 1,500 Australian children are hospitalised for influenza each year.

Children under nine years of age who have not been vaccinated previously are recommended to receive two doses the first year they get vaccinated.

"I encourage all pharmacists to take the opportunity this winter to discuss vaccination with parents and carers to reduce the risk of serious illness due to influenza in young children," said Mr Jackson.

"The benefits of vaccination far out weigh way any of the risk of being harmed by the vaccine.

"Vaccination is the best way to protect children from unnecessary illness due to influenza."

National exercise guidelines released

NEW national exercise guidelines, released yesterday, say everyone should get a minimum of 30 minutes of physical activity each day - regardless of their age or physical condition.

The guidleines are part of the government's plan to promote healthy ageing.

Dubbed the *Physical Activity Recommendations for Older Australians*, the guidelines suggest a range of activities to improve strength, fitness and flexibility.

Recommended activities include walking, vacuuming, golf, and even carrying the groceries.

Qld Health Minister

QUEENSLAND'S new deputy premier Paul Lucas has been handed the health portfolio, becoming the fourth Qld health minister in 11 years.

Reappointed premier Anna Bligh said that improving the health system in Qld will be one of the incoming govt's top priorities.

DISPENSARY

GARDENERS in the UK are being warned that getting out among the plants after a winter break can require the same preparation as that required for elite athletes going into a final.

The British College of Osteopathic Medicine has issued the alert at the start of the northern spring, saying that gardeners "shouldn't simply head out, pick up a spade and start digging."

Instead they should stretch before starting and always take regular breaks while gardening.

The college's head, Dr Ian Drysdale, said doctors tended to see a surge in "gardeningrelated injuries" such as strains and sprains during spring.

NOW this is dedication. A surgeon in Italy has successfully completed brain surgery on a patient, despite himself suffering a heart attack during the procedure.

59-year-old Dr Claudio Vitale said he realised his patient would die if he stopped to seek treatment for himself.

They're both now recovering side by side in the hospital's intensive care ward.

BIRTH control has caused a major riot in Paris this week, with police arresting 11 young people in protests about Pope Benedict XVI's views about condom use in Africa.

Pro-condom activists staged a protest outside the French capital's iconic Notre Dame cathedral, handing out free condoms to worshippers as they left after Sunday mass.

Some of the churchgoers took violent exception to posters of the pontiff labelling him an "assassin" because of the impact condom use could have on HIV.
