# New acne treatment

A NEW once-daily prescriptiononly topical acne treatment has become available in Australia.

Epiduo Gel combines a retinoid (adapalene 0.1%) and an antimicrobial (benzoyl peroxide 2.5%) with the two different therapies meaning health professionals are able to treat both the cause and symptoms of acne in a single medication.

Epiduo can also potentially improve adherence and outcomes because it's a sinale daily treatment.

It's approved by the TGA for the cutaneous treatment of acne vulgaris on the face, chest and back when comedones, papules and pustules are present, and the condition has not responded to first line treatment

Warning on fake flu meds THE Complementary Healthcare Council and the Australian Self-Medication Industry have issued a joint warning to consumers, urging them to avoid complementary medicines or medications that claim to treat or prevent swine flu. The two associations are also

urging their member companies to refuse to stock or sell such items.

"The public should be wary of internet sites and other promotions for products that claim to diagnose, prevent, mitigate, treat or cure the 2009 H1N1 influensza virus that have not been proven to be safe and effective for these uses by the Therapeutic Goods Administration," they said in a joint statement. # SUSDP now online

THE Standard for the Uniform Scheduling of Drugs and Poisons is now available in electronic form on the ComLaw website at the Federal Register of Legislative Instruments (FRLI), which is an authoritative online source of Commonwealth legislation and other instruments.

The naming conventions on the FRLI are slightly different to the way the SUSDP is usually named, with SUSDP No. 23 available on FRLI as Poisons Standard 2008 - with Amendment No. 3 which became effective 01 May listed as 'Poisons Standard Amendment No. 1 of 2009'.

SUSDP No. 23 is effective up until 31 Aug 2009, with number 24 set to be issued in Jul.

# Lyrica reduced pain

**PATIENTS** suffering from posttraumatic peripheral nerve pain treated with Lyrica (pregabalin) capsules experienced "significantly reduced pain compared to those taking placebo," according to data presented this week at the American Academy of Neurology annual meeting.

Lyrica is manufactured by Pfizer and is indicated for the treatment of neuropathic pain in adults.

# Clinical trial pact

AUSTRALIAN-based clinical data firm Novotech has announced a strategic joint venture with Indian multinational ETI Klinical Pvt Ltd (part of the Karle Group).

Novotech ceo Alek Safarian said the JV would "leverate the huge opportunities in the growing Indian clinical research sector and drive more global studies to the country."

The new operation will give clients access to 92 pregualified sites across India, covering over 5 million patients and 13,000 beds.

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## **Bronchitol** approval Kid's OTC medicine talks

THE TGA has designated Pharmaxis' Bronchitol (mannitol) as an orphan drug, for the treatment of patients with cystic fibrosis to improve lung function and reduce pulmonary exacerbations.

The move follows positive results from a recently completed Phase III clinical trial of Bronchitol in people with cystic fibrosis, which found that it had improved lung function.

Pharmaxis ceo Alan Robertson said "we now know that it can change the therapeutic landscape for many of the 75,000 people with this disease."

THE World Health Organization has announced it will send 2.4 million treatment courses of Tamiflu to 72 countries deemed to be in need, including Mexico.

Roche donated the stockpiles to the WHO several years ago, with shipments to be made from three "hubs" in Switzerland, Maryland in the USA and Dubai.

WHO spokesperson Fadela Chaib said the organisation would also supplement six regional stockpiles for "contingency" use in countries if outbreaks of swine flu occur.

US Food and Drug Administration as it gathers information about children's cough and cold products."

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The makers of the medicines in the USA have commenced a wide ranging research and education program to inform regulatory authorities, healthcare professionals and consumers.

"The leading makers of these medicines are working very closely with the FDA to provide the necessary evidence on safety and efficacy of such products," said ASMI Scientific Director, Deon Schoombie.

"These initiatives will be important in ensuring that parents and carers have access to the best available treatments for their families." he added.

The program includes pharmacokinetic studies to confirm the dosing for the eight most commonly used OTC oral cough and cold remedies in children aged two to 12, as well as continued collection and review of available safety data.

# Push for pharmacist paid maternity leave

THE Pharmacists Division of the Association of Professional Engineers, Scientists and Managers, Australia (APESMA) is urging the introduction of paid maternity leave for pharmacists.

"Given the majority of new pharmacy graduates and registrants are female, a paid maternity leave scheme will provide the opportunity to spend time with their newborn and not have to feel that they must return to work quickly to help supplement the family income," said division president Geoff March.

He said that APESMA along with the ACTU had been lobbying the government to introduce a paid maternity leave scheme as soon as possible, with hopes that such a plan may be announced in next week's Federal Budget.

"A paid maternity scheme also assists employers to retain their skilled employees," March added.
