OTC Update Weight Loss

Many customers will be asking for help in shedding extra kilos in time for summer, so this month we are looking at different products available to aid in weight loss. Today our focus will be on:

Diet pills and other supplements.

Losing weight is alot harder than putting it on. It is a slow process and customers need to set realistic goals.

Losing half a kilo a week is a good target for weight loss.

Many people like to try to assist their weight loss by taking supplements or pills that claim to speed up weight loss.

Most of the products on the market claim to INCREASE metabolism and SUPPRESS appetite as well as BURN fat. But what do they contain to substantiate these claims?

Supplements such as Fat Blaster, Hydroxycut, Xenadrine RFA-1 and Xantrax contain combinations of herbs and nutrients as well as some vitamins.

Most contain Garcinia or Guarana or Caffeine which are stimulants - they suppress the appetite and increase metabolic rate. Many contain antioxidants such as green tea (in various different forms) which is claimed to work to help support a healthy metabolism.

Some also contain fibre such as Pysillium Husk which they claim assists the absorption of fat in the diet.

There are also various Detox programs available on the market; many of these also contain a variety of herbs to help slimming as well as detoxing the system

Bulking agents may also help weight loss by inducing a sense of fullness by swelling in the stomach, thus decreasing appetite. eg Fybogel, Agiofibe.

Project STOP recommended

AN international drug symposium held in Sydney last week has recommended that the Pharmacy Guild's Project STOP anti-diversion system for pseudoephedrine be made compolusory.

The NSW Police department proposed making the medications prescription-only (**PD** 19 Oct) but the Australasian Chemical Diversion Conference finally resolved to instead advocate the online pharmacy tracking system.

Faulding is back!

SYMBION has today announced the relaunch of its Faulding brand, saying the move further reinforces its aggressive focus on OTC categories.

The first new Faulding-branded product is *Faulding Heart Health* which is scheduled to be exclusively available from Symbion pharmacies by the end of October.

"Initial feedback we've received from our pharmacists is that they're very excited to be able to offer new and unique products to consumers under the trusted Faulding brand," said Symbion's consumer products marketing manager Lisa Roberton.

Roberton said the relaunch of Faulding was part of a move to provide Symbion customers with a greater range of differentiated product across different categories.

"Our private label has shown strong growth and while we will continue to drive house brands, we're also now aggressively focusing on developing specific differentiated products which will augment these," she said.

Faulding Heart Health is a oncedaily combination of Co-enzyme Q10 and Policosanol - two strong sellers as separate products. Project STOP is mandatory in Qld but only an estimated 60% of pharmacies in NSW are currently using the program.

The Pharmacy Guild has urged that the technology be mandated nationwide.

NSW Police Minister Michael Daly said that over the past year NSW police have seized around 40kg of amphetamines with a street value of \$21.5 million.

Around one third of the pseudoephedrine used to make the drug ice is thought to be bought or stolen from pharmacies, he said.

H1N1 emergency

US President Barack Obama has declared swine flu to be a national emergency, clearing the path for health-care providers to respond quickly to sick patients.

Swine flu has claimed over 1000 lives in the US since April, and the supply of vaccines continues to be outstripped by demand.

The declaration states that "the rates of illness continue to rise rapidly within many communites across the nation, and the potential exists for the pandemic to overburden health care resources in some localities."

It allows the waiving of federal requirements for the prescription and distribution of medications, allowing patients to access drugs more quickly.

The World Health Organisation said on Friday that at least 5000 people have died from swine flu, but the number could by higher.

MEANWHILE, reports have emerged that Rhode Island has become the first US state to track swine flu by using electronic pharmacy prescription data.

Breast cancer report

THE Australian Institute of Health and Welfare and the National Breast and Ovarian Cancer Centre have released a new report showing that while the number of women being diagnosed with breast cancer is increasing, death rates are continuing to fall.

The report was released today to coincide with Breast Cancer Day.

Dr Adriana Vanden Heuvel from AIHW said the number of women diagnosed with breast cancer each year will climb to 15,000 by 2015.

The report says 1 in 9 Australian women will develop breast cancer.

Food labelling review

FOOD labelling laws in Australia are facing an overhaul.

Former health minister Dr Neal Blewett was appointed last Fri to head up a review panel that will undertake a comprehensive review of food labelling law and policy.

Blewett was appointed by the Australian Parliamentary Secretary for Health, Mark Butler, who said the review will "play an important role both for consumers who are looking for clarity in labelling and industry who are looking for certainty about their roles and responsibilities."

The terms of reference of the review were released on Friday and submissions are being welcomed.

A NEW anti-obesity drua has shown promising results during overseas trials.

Patients given liraglutide lost over 6.3kg in five months, almost double the amount lost by patients using different forms of medication.

The results show that the drug could stimulate dramatic weight loss in patients at risk of developing type 2 diabetes.

price cuts announced in the PBS reforms to save the taxpayer \$3 billion over 10 years.

"This new report shows that PBS reform will actually deliver savings to the public purse of \$6 billion, \$3 billion more than the govt had banked on," he said.

Dr Shaw said that no further reforms to the PBS are needed and that the sustainability of the PBS is no longer in question.

The report said that average growth of the PBS will be around 3.7% each year to 2013-14.

It also found that over ten years manufacturers would lose \$8.13 billion in sales revenue and wholesalers will lose \$591 million as a result of the reforms.

Pharmacists are projected to be bettter off by \$2.34 billion, while patients will save \$420 million.

The savings to the government are predicted at \$5.96 billion.

The Guild welcomed the new report, saying it confirms the report it commissioned earlier this year which also found that savings to the government from the reforms would be bigger than predicted.

"One thing that Medicines Australia and The Pharmacy Guild of Australia certainly agree on is that the Government estimates were far too conservative and PBS Reforms will have major impacts on the pharmaceutical sector," the Guild said.
