lodine research

A STUDY conducted in New Zealand has found that daily iodine supplementation improved cognition in mildly iodine deficient children.

The study is the first in the world to target kids aged 10-13 with mild iodine deficiency, and was reported this week in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition.

Australian endocrinologist and iodine expert, Professor Creswell Eastman, said the "groundbreaking research" showed that every second child in Australia could potentially benefit from an increase in iodine intake".

R U OK? Day

THE National Prescribing Service is one of the official supporters of R U OK? Day which was announced this morning in Canberra by Health Minister Nicola Roxon, as part of World Suicide Prevention Day.

The initiative aims to address high rates of suicide by bringing Australians together to help prevent its risk factors.

R U OK? Day will take place on 29 Nov and will promote awareness of information and support by raising the profile of a number of organisations providing these services to the community.

NPS is taking part because of its role in providing information on medicines which play a big part in helping people with depression.

pseudoephedrine tracking system. It's the latest move in a campaign by the Pharmacy Guild of New Zealand which has for some time been urging the NZ govt to consider introducing the initiative, as part of the fight against illicit amphetamine manufacturers, who make products known as 'P'.

"As frontline health professionals, pharmacists see firsthand the devastating effects of the drug 'P' on New Zealand communities," said NZ Guild ceo Annabel Young. "The majority of customers wanting these products are using them for legitimate reasons and we

Heparin standards

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration this morning issued details of a proposed new Therapeutic Goods Order covering a standard for Heparin.

The TGA is seeking written submissions on the document, which sets out the particular requirements for heparin when used in a therapeutic good or used as a precursor to an ingredient or component in a therapeutic good, which will help to ensure that the contaminant over-sulfated chondroitin sulfate (OSCS) is not present.

The move follows the identification of the contaminant in some heparin products last year (**PD** 25 Mar 08) after an increase

was observed in serious allergic reactions associated with the use of heparin for injection.

A series of worldwide recalls eventuated leading to shortages of heparin, while the TGA introduced a requirement for a number of heparin-containing products to be tested by manufacturers.

New DIA chief

THE Drug Information Association has announced that Paul Pomerantz will become its new worldwide executive director effective 01 Dec.

Pomerantz replaces William Brassington, who's been acting in the role since Jul 2008.

Guild offers NZ Project Stop THE Pharmacy Guild of Australia would like them to be able to

continue doing so.

"Project Stop will give pharmacists the ability to sell these medicines with confidence," she added, giving police the ability to focus their attention on other sources of the drug.

Radio New Zealand yesterday reported on the free trial, with the Pharmacy Guild of Australia saying it's contributed to a 42.5% reduction in the number of clandestine labs operating here in the last four years.

The pseudoephedrine issue is contentious in New Zealand, where the country's chief science adviser has recommended rescheduling the compound as prescription-only, or even banning it completely.

Last Dec the Australian National Chemical Diversion Congress held its annual meeting in Wellington, NZ, and also called for the introduction of a similar program to Project Stop to monitor and control the sale of pseudoephedrinecontaining medicines from New Zealand pharmacies.



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Consumer input to code review

NEXT week's Therapeutic Goods Administration Industry Consultative Committee meeting will hear from a number of organisations on Parliamentary Secretary for Health Mark Butler's push for ethical promotion of therapeutic goods (*PD* yesterday).

It's understood that as well as industry bodies, the consumer perspective will also be presented by at least one organisation including the Consumers Health Forum of Australia.

MEANWHILE Medicines Australia ceo lan Chalmers welcomed the govt's commitment to a "level playing field for marketing obligations," with ceo lan Chalmers saying there was currently "an uneven operating environment for the conduct of pharmaceutical companies which undermines public confidence in the industry."

He said he was looking forward to contributing to a "solution that sees all companies required to meet a common ethical standard of professional conduct."

Big bottle blitz

MORE than 250,000 hot water bottles have been recalled across Australia since the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission initiated a nationwide blitz on inferior products.

Random checks of 30 brands of hot water bottles have seen more than half fail mandatory safety standards, said ACCC deputy chairman, Peter Kell.

18 of the brands didn't comply with requirements mandating acceptable bottle thickness and stringent quality levels relating to leakage, seam strength and pressure.

The blitz followed a spate of severe burns due to hot water bottles splitting, leaking or bursting.

Brands voluntarily withdrawn or removed from shelves by the ACCC include 'Cuddly', 'Dr Hot', 'Home Master', 'Stillwater', the H1304 2 litre bottle supplied by New Global International in NSW and the TRS Trading Group's bottle sold in 'The Reject Shop' stores.

Fosamax US lawsuit

A US federal judge has rejected attempts by Merck & Co to have 24 cases alleging that biphosphonate osteoporosis treatment Fosamax causes jaw damage dismissed.

The judge ruled that testimony from two doctors claiming jaw damage after less than three years of continuous use could be admitted, saying it was "sufficiently reliable to allow a rational jury to establish such a connection".

Merck is facing claims from almost 900 patients saving Fosamax caused osteonecrosis of the jaw.

DISPENSARY CORNER

A MASTER cheese-grader in the UK has insured his nose for £5m. 63-year-old Nigel Pooley has worked at Wyke Farms for 12 years, selecting more than 12,000 tonnes of cheddar every year with his expert sense of smell.

Lloyds of London will cover the specialist schnozz on behalf of the company, which relies on his expertise to select and save the best cheeses.

The insurer said Mr Pooley "breaks new ground as our first cheese nose".

IT'S good to be tall, according to a US study which found that people of higher than average stature live better lives.

The Journal of Economics and Human Biology reported on the study, which involved a telephone poll of more than 454,000 adults who were asked for their height and an evaluation of their life.

Men who were taller than 178cm consistently rated their lives higher than shorter men, while there was a similar but smaller effect for women.

The authors of the study said the findings were almost entirely explained by the positive association between height and both income and education.

A CHINESE fat cat could be the fattest feline in the world, according to its owner who's hoping to get his pretty pussy into the Guinness Book of Records.

Xu Jirong of Qingdao in the northern Shandong province said his cat has a 70cm waist and puts on more than a kilogram in weight every year.

"I suspect the problem is that she much prefers pork to fish," he said, adding that "she can swallow down four or five pieces of raw pork within minutes." The cat is named Chubby.
