QCPP accreditation

THE Quality Care Pharmacy Program has confirmed that it's commenced the process of becoming accredited under the Joint Accreditation System for Australia and New Zealand.

A committee has been formed including representatives from the PSA, Health Department, TGA, Consumers Health Forum, the SHPA and pharmaceutical industry, to review the current standards as part of the process.

This is because a key part of the accreditation scheme is showing that the "program has been developed with the participation of technically competent representatives of interested parties, or has been subjected to formal review of such parties and subsequently revised as appropriate."

Any revisions recommended by this Standards Committee will be presented in the format of the QCPP Standards 2nd Edition.

Self-regulation slammed

The Healthy Skepticism event was attended by Parliamentary Secretary for Health, Mark Butler as well as Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee chairman Lloyd Sansom, with speakers incl Chris Doecke, Agnes Vitry, Peter Mansfield and Ken Harvey.

Concern was expressed about the lack of transparency of the TGA and its total dependence on industry funding, and it was argued

Claims up in smoke

THE Australian Competition and Consumer Commission has warned that some smoking addiction therapists are making "unproven and misleading claims" about their success rates.

ACCC acting chairman Peter Kell cited some hypnotherapists including a company called Stop Smoking in One Hour which "could not substantiate advertised claims that 100% of smokers successfully give up after attending a maximum of four treatment sessions".

He also said a number of 'stop smoking' laser therapy clinics around Australia had been forced to amend their advertising after the ACCC raised concerns that the technology had proven success rates of up to 90%, was capable of completely eliminating nicotine addiction, and was effective after just an hour's treatment.

The laser therapy claims to promote the production of natural endorphins by stimulating certain points on the body, with the release of the hormones apparently helping smokers to overcome their addiction

"After reviewing existing research on low level laser treatments and giving the clinics an opportunity to substantiate claims, the ACCC was concerned that the clinics were over-promising and misleading consumers," Kell said.

"Smokers trying to give up are entitled to accurate information about the effectiveness and reliability of the treatments available to them," he added. that the current inconsistent, ineffective and inefficient selfregulatory codes and complaint systems should be replaced by a new single system applying to all therapeutic claims and promotional activities regardless of the product.

Butler emphasised that both he and Health Minister Nicola Roxon felt that the current inconsistencies in codes and sanctions were "unacceptable" but added that their preference was to see if selfregulation could deliver the outcomes required.

Other recommendations made during the event included more independent funding of continuing medical education to reduce the perceived need for drug company supported educational activities, public funding of clinical trials and post-marketing pharmacovigilance studies, and regular reviews and updating of product information and PBS listings when new evidence arises.

A public debate also reiterated the urgent need for electronic health initiatives to help better evaluate the risk-benefit ration of new drugs in the real world.

The debate continues tonight on the ABC radio program 'The National Interest' at 6.10pm.

Palliative care report

THE National Prescribing Service has today released its new report on palliative medicine (*PD* 11 Sep) at the Australian Palliative Care Conference in Perth.

Palliative Care Australia ceo Donna Daniell said the report has helped prioritise areas for change including application of the current and emerging evidence base for medicines use at end of Ife, as well as working to promote the safe and effective use of opioids.

The report identifies the need for clearer guidelines around reducing medications as patients at end stages of life because they're no longer contributing to quality of life.

'Opioid-phobia' is also identified as a barrier to adequate pain management, while the report also urges the development of comprehensive guidelines around the safe use, storage and disposal of medicines in the home.

MA urges level playing field

MEDICINES Australia chairman Will Delaat says a common standard of "transparency and accountability" should apply right across the therapeutics sector, with the organisation today publishing a report on hospitality provided by pharmaceutical companies over the last six months.

There were more than 16000 educational events, with a total cost of \$31.89m including \$15.65m on hospitality.

"It is important that doctors' relationships with pharmaceutical companies are based on integrity and transparency," he said.

"That is why Medicines Australia publishes these reports...There is no such transparency elsewhere in the therapeutics sector."

Delaat said companies which choose not to belong to Medicines Australia have no obligation to publish the details of their engagements with health professionals, adding that there is

"no good reason" why different standards should apply.

"There must be a consistent standard and I am encouraged that the Government has indicated its desire for a level playing field".

The chairman said doctors derive genuine professional benefit from the events, which saw companies providing them with "current, accurate and balanced information.

"These engagements are legitimate, appropriate and, in the case of Medicines Australia members, transparent," he insisted.

HIV vaccination

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A STUDY undertaken by the Thai Ministry of Public Health has found that an experimental vaccination cut the risk of being infected by HIV by more than 30%.

The trial involved over 16000 participants, and it's the first time in human trials a vaccine has been found to be effective against HIV.

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THEY'RE usually considered to be very much on the fringe of health care, but hairdressers could have a key role to play in mental health according to a new US report.

A survey of 40 stylists showed that they develop close relationships with clients, with most willing to refer them for help if needed.

They also see their clients regularly over many years and can tell if they're unhappy, unwell or even losing cognitive function.

The Journal of Applied Gerontology published the report which also found that many hairdressers were interested in having formal training in mental health to assist their clients.

YOUR taxpayer dollars at work. A report in today's Sydney Morning Herald says that a new hotline operated by the NSW Health Department has attracted just six calls since being established over a month ago.

The 'mixed gender bed' phone number is a recommendation of the damning Garling enquiry which urged the abolition of mixed gender wards except in emergency and intensive care wards because they "significantly impede patient care".

The hotline is for patients to request another bed because of gender issues, and operates seven days a week from 7am to 11pm.

It was set up at a cost of \$32,000, meaning each call so far has cost taxpayers over \$5000.

IT all started in pharmacy.

Publicly listed Washington H. Soul Pattinson has joined a select club of Australian companies by yesterday reporting an annual profit of more than \$1 billion.

Now a diversified investment group, much of the bonanza was the result of the sale of the New Hope coal operation to BHP.

WHSP chairman Robert Millner said the company has about \$400m in cash and is "looking at buying other businesses".

API, which is 24.6% owned by WHSP, contributed \$3.9m.
