THE Australian Self Medication Industry has responded to research published in the British Medical Journal which linked an increased risk of heart disease with calcium supplements (*PD* 30 Jul), saying the association was "controversial".

According to ASMI, the researchers' conclusion that the use of calcium supplements would need to be reassessed due to the possibility of an increase to a person's risk of heart disease, was arguable due to the existence of other recent studies including the WA Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital's *Calcium supplementation and the risks of atherosclerotic vascular disease in older women* study which ruled out the relationship .

In backing up its position ASMI also cited the Brigham and Women's Hospital and Harvard School of Public Health's 'Systematic review: Vitamin D and calcium supplementation in prevention of cardiovascular

Asthma awareness

THE National Asthma Council has launched a new Asthma and Allergic Rhinitis Patient Awareness Resource for use by GPs and pharmacists in the lead up to allergy season.

The kit includes a 'Is your nose making your asthma worse' poster, as well as a 'checkbox screener card' which helps patients to identify common symptoms and to understand the link between allergies and asthma.

Accutane action

ROCHE is facing a US\$12 million dollar lawsuit from a former user of its highly popular acne drug, Accutane.

According to reports, the plaintiff, Hollywood actor James Marshall (A Few Good Men, Twin Peaks), has filed the suit after he had to have his colon removed following bowel complications, which he says were directly related to the use of the drug.

No stranger to lawsuits, Accutane was taken off the US market last year, and has been blamed by users for many side effects, including severe depression.

The company has however defended itself saying that Accutane's 13 million former users have known of the drug's potential side effects (including its links to bowel disease) via labelling advice for the last two decades.

Unlike former Accutane cases this one is set to garner some media attention with the line up of witnesses set to include actor Martin Sheen and director Rob Reiner.

Quality of laxative life

A RECENT randomised, doubleblind placebo-controlled study of the laxative agent bisacodyl, has found that its use can increase the quality of life, as well as everyday functioning and well being, in constipation sufferers.

Aimed at determining the efficacy of 10mg oral bisacodyl tablets in chronic constipation sufferers, the study gathered information from 368 patients, and showed that "treatment improved all measured symptoms of constipation at nearly every point assessed".

"Oral bisacodyl proved to be an effective, well-tolerated treatment for patients with constipation," said President of the Gut Foundation Professor Terry Bolin.

"It increased bowel frequency and improved the associated symptoms of constipation such as bloating and abdominal discomfort.

"Moreover, treatment with bisacodyl had a sustained impact: The benefit was maintained over the four week study period, with no signs of habituation," he added.

IN the wake of the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia is set to host a series of talks across Australian universities regarding its own National Intern Training Program (NITP).

PSA talks National Intern

Designed to help early career pharmacists in the transition between student and practicing pharmacist the NITP is made up of interactive workshops and workplace based activities, and incorporates discussion of both national and state-level pharmacy issues to take into account the national registration changes.

The program also facilitates interaction between pharmacists and interns nationwide, and currently sees around 900 interns graduate per annum.

According to a PSA statement students need to be aware that the course is "is not just an extension of university, but a specifically developed program with a focus on the workplace with the utilisation of

pharmacists' skills and knowledge in practice.

FDA labelling issues

THE US Food and Drug Administration has pledged to publish its draft guidance to reduce medication errors by no later than 30 September.

According to the agency medication naming, labelling and packaging practices play a large role in medication errors, clocking up a whopping 30% responsibility for all fatal errors reported to the US Institute for Safe Medication Practices, and methods to remedy this will feature largely in the new guidelines.

Medicines safety

THE TGA has published the fourth edition of its Medicines Safety Update on its website.

The new edition features an update on Varenicline (Champix) and including product summary information, psychiatric symptoms reported with varenicline and what to include in an varenicline a adverse reaction report.

The Medicines Safety Update also includes a report on the Australian experience with nonadjuvant H1N1 vaccine (Panvax and Panvax Junior), as well as information on the new TGA structural arrangements.

A MAJOR blow against dengue fever has been struck in Taiwan this month, after a successful competition encouraging the populace to catch mosquitos.

The winner of the competition walked away with a cash prize worth about \$4000 after catching more than four million mozzies in a month.

Huang Yu-yen from the southern Yunlin province brought in a catch weighing more than 1.5kg - more than double that of her nearest rival.

Organisers have sent a report to the Guinness World Records in the hope that Huang be recognised as the world's leading mosquito-killer.

TOKYO'S oldest is actually dead. The oldest "living" man in Tokyo has been dead for the past 30 years.

Reported to be aged 111 this year, Sogen Kato was born in 1899, and was found earlier in the week in a mummified state in his home.
