J&J recalls contact lenses

JOHNSON & Johnson has issued a recall notice for several batches of its 1 Day Acuvue contact lenses, some of which have been sold in Australia as well as Japan, Europe and several Asian markets.

The company said it had received a limited number of complaints from customers in Japan who said they had experienced an "unusual stinging or pain" when inserting the Acuvue TruEye brand lenses.

J&J estimated about 100,000 boxes of lenses manufactured in Ireland were affected by the failure of a piece of equipment which rinses the lenses during manufacture

Affected countries also include Singapore, Malaysia, Hong Kong, South Korea, Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Norway, Portugal, Russia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey and the UK.

A statement issued by J&J said it hadn't received reports of customers with damaged vision.

"The risk of long-term health consequences is very unlikely," said a J&J Vision Care spokesman.

It's the ninth time in a year that 1&1 has issued recalls of nonprescription medicines.

recipe for success'.



APESMA pharmacy report

THE Association of Professional Engineers, Scientists and Managers Australia has published a special report on the remuneration of community and hospital pharmacists across Australia.

The document summarises the findings of a survey conducted during April and May this year, with participants including APESMA Pharmacists' Divisoin members, SHPA members and a sample from State Pharmacists registers.

Out of 8000 surveys sent out, approximately 1500 completed questionnaires were returned, with the results summarised state by state and covering a range of issues such as qualification levels, gender, experience, hours of work and hourly rates.

The report showed that on average the base hourly rate for Community Pharmacists has risen 1.8% in the last year to \$38.20 - which APESMA says is less than the average increases in other technical and science professional groups, as well as being lower than CPI.

Other interesting statistics collated include whether pharmacists are paid for working through meal breaks, levels of superannuation, and penalty rates for weekends and public holidays.

The report has been released to members of the Pharmacists Division of APESMA, which also said that members have been calling to clarify the provisions of the new Pharmacy Industry Award.

Guild MoU delay

THE Pharmacy Guild says that because the government hasn't passed the legislation required to pass the Medicines Australia Memorandum of Understanding, the implementation should be delayed from the planned 01 October start date.

Guild President Kos Sclavos has today been reported saying that 01 March 2011 would be a better start date, because of the uncertainty surrounding the election and the legislation needing to pass both houses of parliament.

Medicines Australia is pushing hard for the MoU to be passed as soon as possible, but the Guild says pharmacists need more time to adjust to a "new trading environment" under the reforms.

DISPENSARY CORNER

THE obesity crisis is hitting the aviation industry, with a group of flight attendants at Turkish Airlines grounded last week because they weigh too much.

The carrier says the 28 staff have been given six months to slim down or face reassignment, according to a report in Istanbul's the *Haber Turk* newspaper.

The airline issued a statement saying "weight and height are important factors at all airlines.

"These criteria are important both in terms of appearance and the ability to move about," the airline said.

GOOD news for chocoholics women who eat dark chocolate once or twice a week could be lowering their risk of heart failure.

But you can't overdo it - the Boston study reported in the Journal of the American Heart Association found that there was no benefit from those who ate chocolate every day.

One to two 19-30g servings of dark chocolate per week led to a 32% decrease in heart failure risk.

This fell to 26% when between one and three servings per month were eaten, the *BBC* said, while those who ate chocolate every day had no reduced risk at all.

GROUNDBREAKING research in Switzerland has found that children who squint are less likely to be invited to birthday parties.

Scientists showed more than 100 children aged between three and 12 pictures of twins - one with a squint and one without - and asked who they would prefer to celebrate their birthday with.

In an overwhelming vote for clearsightedness, older children repeatedly chose the twin without an optical disorder.

Children aged under six made no distinction between the twins, but those aged six to twelve hardly ever picked a squinty buddy.

The researchers suggested that all children undergo corrective surgery before the age of six before "negative social implications may arise".
