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Rural dental concerns

ACCORDING to a recent Oral-B report, around one third of Australian children living in remote communities, low-income families and of indigenous descent, have never seen a dentist.

The report, a collaboration between Dr David Manton of the Melbourne Dental School; Peter Wong from the Australasian Academy of Paediatric Dentistry; Professor Richard Widmer from the Children's Hospital at Westmead; Dr Susan Tregeagle from Barnardos Australia; and Oral-B Dentist Dr Stephen Blatchford, also found that as many as eight in 10 children fail to brush their teeth twice a day.

To combat this, Oral-B has launched a Health Program which is aimed at educating one million Australians on how to achieve healthier mouths; and in its first year will fund a dental grants program for children from regional areas.

As part of the plan, last week a mobile clinic tour launched providing free check-ups for regional living children, whilst any parent or carer of a child found to require dental work will be encouraged to apply for an Oral-B Health Program grant on their behalf.

PBS festive season changes

YESTERDAY seven new medicines became available on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme, for patients suffering a range of conditions including pancreatic cancer, prostate cancer, osteoporosis, bipolar disorder, and hepatitis C.

Included in the approval line up is Pancreatic Extract, Granules (enteric coated) (Creon Micro) to aid patients with insufficient pancreatic enzymes (which can arise as a result of cystic fibrosis, chronic pancreatitis and pancreatic cancer) to digest food.

The second PBS approval is for Degarelix, Powder for injection (Firmagon) now available as an alternative product for patients with prostate cancer.

It is estimated that around 90,000 Australians will also benefit from the new PBS listing for Denosumab, Injection 60 mg in 1mL pre-filled syringe (Prolia), which is now available as an alternative injectable, longduration treatment for osteoporosis.

Other approvals include Epoetin Lamda, Injection (Novocrit) for patients with kidney disease, where the disease causes low iron count; Ribavirin and peginterferon alfa-2a, (Pegasys RBV) to treat patients with hepatitis C; and Quetiapine, Tablet (Seroquel) and Quetiapine, Tablet (modified release) (Seroquel XR) as an additional medicine for the maintenance treatment of bipolar I

The final listing for December relates to Cetrorelix, (Cetrotide) as an alternative therapy to help patients undergoing IVF treatment.

THE Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee has, from 01 December, removed the PBS restriction on GSKs Tykerb (lapatinib ditosylate) which had previously prevented patients from returning to Commonwealthfunded treatment with trastuzumab after progression on Tykerb.

NEW PRODUCTS

Exforge HCT (amlodipine + valsartan + hydrochlorothiazide) combines three antihypertensive compounds with complementary mechanisms of action to control blood pressure in patients with essential hypertension. The combination of these ingredients has an additive antihypertensive effect, reducing blood pressure to a greater degree than individual components alone. Exforge HCT is indicated only as substitution therapy for the treatment of hypertension in patients whose blood pressure is already adequately controlled on the triple combination of amlodipine, valsartan and hydrochlorothiazide taken either as three single-component formulations or as a dual-component formulation with a singlecomponent formulation, all components at the same dose level. Treatment should not be initiated with these fixed-dose combinations. Contraindications to Exforge HCT are hypersensitivity to dihydropyridine derivatives, other sulfonamide-derived drugs; severe hepatic impairment; biliary cirrhosis and cholestasis; severe renal impairment (GFR < 30 mL/min/1.73 m2), anuria and patients undergoing dialysis; refractory hypokalaemia, hyponatraemia, hypercalcaemia and symptomatic hyperuricaemia; pregnancy. Exforge HCT is PBS listed and contains amlodipine/ valsartan/ hydrochlorothiazide in the strengths Exforge HCT 5/160/12.5, Exforge HCT 10/160/12.5, Exforge HCT 5/160/25. Exforge HCT 10/160/25 and Exforge

Creon Micro is a porcine pancreatic enzyme preparation containing Pancreatic Extract encapsulated in enteric-coated granules with pH-sensitive coating. Each dosing unit of 100 mg of Creon Micro contains Pancreatic Extract 60.12 mg equivalent to not less than 5,000 BP units lipase, 3,600 BP units amylase and 200 Ph. Eur. units protease. Creon Micro is indicated as pancreatic enzyme replacement in paediatric and adult patients with pancreatic exocrine insufficiency (PEI). Creon Micro is PBS listed and available as brown entericcoated granules, 20 g in a glass bottle.

Novicrit (epoetin lambda (rch)) is purified from a Chinese hamster ovary (CHO) cell line into which the gene coding for human erythropoietin has been inserted. It has been developed as a similar biological medicinal product to epoetin alfa. Erythropoietin stimulates erythropoiesis in anaemic patients with chronic renal failure in whom the endogenous production of erythropoietin is impaired. Patients who develop pure red cell aplasia (PRCA) following treatment with an erythronoietin should not receive ennetin lambda (rch) or any other erythropoietin. Novicrit is available as single-dose, pre-filled syringes (packs of 6) in the following strengths: 1,000 IU/0.5 mL, 2,000 IU/1.0 mL, 3,000 IU/0.3 mL, 4,000 IU/0.4 mL, 5,000 IU/0.5 mL, 6,000 IU/ 0.6 mL, 8,000 IU/0.8 mL and 10,000 IU/1.0 mL

NEW INDICATIONS

Fragmin (dalteparin sodium) is now indicated in extended treatment of symptomatic venous thromboembolism (VTE) (proximal deep vein thrombosis and/or pulmonary

embolism) to reduce the recurrence of VTF in patients with solid tumour cancers.

SAFETY RELATED CHANGES

Clarinase tablets are now named Claratyne-D with Decongestant Repetabs (Joratadine 5 mg pseudoephedrine sulfate

Drugs which induce hepatic microsomal enzymes, such as barbiturates, phenytoin and rifampicin, administered before or during treatment may shorten the elimination half-life of Dexmethsone (dexamethasone). Longterm corticosteroid therapy may also reduce the half-life. Oral contraceptives have been reported to increase the volume of distribution.

Administration of live or live-attenuated vaccines in patients immunocompromised by chemotherapeutic agents including Fluorouracil Injection BP (fluorouracil) may result in serious or fatal infections. Vaccination with a live vaccine should be avoided in patients receiving fluorouracil. Killed or inactivated vaccines may be administered; however, the response to such vaccines may be diminished.

Ritalin 10. Ritalin LA (methylphenidate hydrochloride) is now contraindicated in patients with pre-existing cardiovascular disorders including uncontrolled hypertension, angina pectoris, arterial occlusive disease especially coronary arteries; heart failure, haemodynamically significant congenital heart disease, cardiomyopathies, myocardial cardiac arrhythmia channelopathies (disorders caused by the dysfunction of ion channels). Prior to initiating

treatment with methylphenidate. should be assessed for cardiovascular and psychiatric disorders and a family history sudden death, ventricular arrhythmia and psychiatric disorders.

During the postmarketing period, severe skin reactions including erythema multiforme, Stevens-Johnson syndrome and toxic epidermal necrolysis have been reported with Roaccutane (isotretinoin). Patients should be monitored closely for severe skin reactions and discontinuation of Roaccutane considered

Cases of erythromelalgia have been reported with the use of Nplate (romiplostim (rbe)).

(ziprasidone hydrochloride) should be used with caution in patients with risk factors for stroke. Any patients treated with atypical antipsychotics should be monitored for symptoms of hyperglycaemia. There have been few reports of hyperglycaemia or diabetes in patients treated with ziprasidone. Patients with diabetes mellitus commencing on atypical antipsychotics should be monitored regularly for worsening of glucose control. Patients with risk factors for diabetes mellitus (e.g. obesity, family history of diabetes) should undergo fasting blood glucose testing when beginning and periodically during treatment with atypical antipsychotics.

NEW FORMULATIONS

Cyklokapron (tranexamic acid) is now available as a solution for injection. It is indicated for use in adults for the reduction of perioperative and postoperative blood

loss and the need for blood transfusion in patients undergoing cardiac surgery, total knee arthroplasty or total hip arthroplasty. It is also indicated in children for the reduction of perioperative and postoperative blood loss and the need for blood transfusion in patients undergoing cardiac surgery. Cyklokapron solution for injection is available as packs of 1 x 10 ampoules each containing 1000 mg tranexamic acid and 10 mL Water for Injections.

Dronalen Plus D-Cal is a combination pack containing Dronalen Plus (alendronate sodium and cholecalciferol (vitamin D3)) in addition to BoneCal tablets (calcium carbonate). It is indicated in the treatment of osteoporosis (confirmed by the finding of low bone mass of at least 2 standard deviations below the gender specific mean for young adults or by the presence of osteoporotic fracture) in select patients where vitamin D and calcium supplementation is recommended. 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Men speaking out on health

AUSTRALIAN men suffering from Benign Prostatic Hyperplasia may mistake their symptoms as a natural part of ageing, according to experts at GlaxoSmithKline's BPH media briefing in Sydney today.

BHP is a non-cancerous enlargement of the prostate gland, and whilst it is not generally life threatening, it is a progressive disease whose lower urinary tract symptoms may be "significant".

If left untreated BHP can lead to acute urinary retention and surgery.

"Many men do not seek help until their symptoms become intolerable or there is a medical emergency," said Henry Woo, Associate Professor of Surgery at Sydney University.

The briefing was held in the wake of GSK receiving Australian marketing approval for Avodart (dutasteride) in combination with an alpha-blocker for men diagnosed with symptomatic benign prostatic hyperplasia.

"Combination therapy has been

proven to positively alter the risk of disease progression and leads to reduction in significant events such as acute urinary retention and need for surgery," Woo added.

MEANWHILE GSK also revealed

the results of its Health Index Study, which involved 1005 men and 1003 women, and found that women are key in driving men to see the doctor.

According to the study results 70% of men suffering symptoms below the belt confided in their partner, whilst 69% of these men consulted their doctor after prompting from their partner.

On a more alarming note, 34% of men admitted to not knowing where their prostate was, and 20% of men admitted to having no idea about health issues including prostate cancer, bowel cancer and benian prostatic hyperplasia.

"It's time for men to take action and see a doctor about any symptoms they may be experiencing," said Dr Camilla Chong, Medical Director, GSK.
