The Pharmacy Guild of Australia **THE** impact of Pfizer ceasing sales of its prescription medication through wholesalers (*PD* yesterday), in combination with the recently passed PBS refoms, will leave Australian Pharmaceutical Industries "with no choice but to look at measures to recover lost income".

According to a statement by API released late yesterday afternoon the company estimates the negative impact of Pfizer's announcement alone will see its revenues drop by around 10-15% - the same proportion as cited by Sigma in its ASX announcement yesterday.

API also estimated that the proposed PBS reforms will cost the wholesale industry as a whole \$220 million over five years, or \$8,800 per pharmacy per annum between

Pharmacist pain grant

THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia, in conjunction with Mundipharma, has announced it will award a grant to a pharmacist who has made "an outstanding contribution to the quality use of medicines through direct clinical care of consumers with persistent pain".

The grant is designed not only to reward pharmacists' efforts, but to encourage future pain management excellence.

"Pharmacists, like doctors, have among their professional responsibilities an important role in monitoring and questioning the use of prescription opioids, and advising patients on the most effective and safe way to take their medications, the Royal Australasian College of Physicians noted in its Prescription Opioid Policy published last year," said PSA ceo, Liesel Wett.

"It said pharmacists should be recognised as key stakeholders in a multidisciplinary group to implement and evaluate policy," she added.

The PSA is now encouraging pharmacists to consider the contribution they make to pain management, including in areas of non-prescription medicines and therapeutic devices, dispensing, medication review or disease state management.

API's new trading terms THE impact of Pfizer ceasing 2010 and 2015.

Yesterday, as a result of Pfizer's decision, API's shares fell by 9.9%.

"The consequential impact of both these changes on earnings has yet to be fully determined however API will put in place measures to address the impact of these changes by reducing customer trading terms, and reviewing its cost base," the company said in a statement.

At present API has said that it is the process of working through the "precise magnitude of the changes required", and will inform customers of their new trading terms "as soon as possible".

API did however confirm that the reductions in trading terms would apply from 01 February next year.

MEANWHILE Pfizer's announcement also saw Sigma's shares drop by a whopping 17.3%.

The move is also expected to reduce the discounts available from wholesalers, according to a story in today's *Financial Review* which quotes Ian Harper from Access Economics saying that the changes "will add further pressure to a PBS supply chain under financial stress.

"Changes of this magnitude cannot be introduced without the dynamics of the sector changing considerably," Harper said.

Mental costs rise

TOTAL spending on mental health services in Australia by governments and private health insurers rose 10% in 2007-08, according to the newly released National Mental Health Report.

The document shows total costs of \$5.32 billion on mentalhealth, with the increase being the largest since the National Mental Health Strategy began in 1993.

Federal Government spending increased by 201% (\$1.3 billion) between 1993 and 2008, while state and territory spending rose 110% (up \$1.7b).

Other major findings of the report showed an 8% increase in hospital beds for mental patients between 2003 and 2008, reversing the previous decade's decline, while "continuing shortages of mental health workers, especially nurses, affected both the quantity and quality of care".

new President, Chief Executive Officer and Director of Pfizer, repl;acing Jeffrey Kindler who has retired from the company.

57-year-old Read is currentlyhead of Pfizer's global biopharmaceutical operations, with responsibility for over 40,000 staff covering the firm's development and commercial operations in 180 countries.

Daily Aspirin dose

RESEARCHERS at Oxford University in the UK have published a study which show a substantial reduction in death rates from cancer in patients who took a small daily dose of aspirin.

The research looked at 25,000 patients across the UK over a foureight year period, and found that those who took aspirin had a 25% lower risk of death from cancer during the trial period, and a 10% reduction in death from any cause.

The benefits accrued even with a dose as low as 75mg per day, with lead researcher Prof Peter Rothwell suggesting it would be helpful for daily aspirin to commence around the age of 45-50 years.

THE Pharmacists' Division of the Association of Professional Engineers, Scientists and Managers Australia (PDA) has announced a new 'Protect your rights at work' industrial campaign following "alarming increases in workplace abuse of conditions by pharmacy employers".

PDA said that since the new Pharmacy Industry Award was introduced in Jan, more than 150 of its pharmacy members had contacted the union with complaints about a range of issues including underpayment of salary and entitlements, unfair dismissals and "cases of bullying and discrimination resulting from members asking about their entitlements under the new Award".

Some of the cases have resulted in "wholly unacceptable" termination of employment because pharmacists have refused to sign an Individual Flexibility Agreement (IFA).

APESMA said it had so far taken 51 cases to Fair Work Australia or other tribunals, with PDA concerned that many members had

Interestingly, APESMA said that all of the unfair dismissal cases it had taken on had not proceeded to arbitration, but were settled at conciliation "because employers have accepted that they did the wrong thing".

Under the new workplace campaign, PDA will survey members and non-members on the level of non-compliance and abuse of rights by pharmacy employers.

APESMA Senior Industrial Officer Jacki Baulch claimed that most of the proposed IFA's "do not meet the legislative no disadvantage requirements, particularly in relation to access to penalty payments and other allowances".

MYLANTA may have been needed by a Russian policeman, who attempted to conceal extorting a bribe by eating the money handed over by his victim.

Traffic police captain Alexei Nikolayev was given a three year suspended sentence for bribery, after demanding money from a driver after pulling him over for an illegal manouvre.

The driver agreed to hand over the cash, but tipped off other police who detained the officer as he picked up the payment.

Nikolayev allegedly then locked himself in his police car and "ate the received money - a 1000 rouble note and two 500-rouble notes," according to a statement from the prosecutor.
