Pharmacy Management 101

There are 3 fundamental economic realities about pharmacy. They are: 1. There is no such thing as an average pharmacy - all pharmacies are different and a number of unique business and operating models are obvious in the Australian pharmacy landscape; 2. Gross margins are in decline; and 3. Increasing reliance on prescriptions and professional services.

Over the next two weeks, I will focus on items 2 and 3; today I would like to discuss item 1 in detail.

Many focus on the mythical "average pharmacy" as being representative of pharmacy.

However, even on something as simple as average turnover (annual sales), the average is not representative.

Of greater concern is that the government, banks, and often even accountants continue to focus on averages without recognising the unique characteristics of each pharmacy.

Average Annual Turnover is highly skewed, with a small number of pharmacies with very high levels of sales pushing the average up.

Approximately 65% of pharmacies have annual sales below the Australian average. Hardly representative.

I believe there are a number of pharmacy models with operational and financial characteristics which make each unique.

Pharmacists ready to help

THE Pharmacy Guild of Australia has renewed its calls for an expansion of the role played by pharmacists, to alleviate the burden placed on Medicare from GP visits for minor ailments.

Guild President Kos Sclavos highlighted an article in last weekend's Sunday Age newspaper which showed that Australians visit the doctor more often than people in other parts of the world.

"If you ever wanted a strong case for the need to support expansion of the pharmacist's role, this is it," he told **PD** yesterday.

According to the story, Australians now make an average of 6.3 visits to the doctor a year more than once every two months compared to 5.8 annual visits in Canada, 5 in the UK, 4.7 in New Zealand and just 3.8 in the USA.

APESMA slams 5CPA

THE Fifth Community Pharmacy Agreement has lost opportunities for the community, according to pharmacy union APESMA.

"The Pharmacy Guild of Australia has negotiated a deal with the Federal Government, under the Community Pharmacy Agreement that has secured the continuation of its one-size-fits-all dispensing model of pharmacy practice for the next five years,' the union said in a statement.

According to APESMA the Fifth Agreement should have more of a focus on a flexible model of pharmacy practice which includes a framework for pharmacists to consult one on one with patients, in an area which would be physically separate from the dispensing area.

This expansion of pharmacists role into patient consultation would see the service adhere to a set of practice standards and include specialist staffers who would have commensurate qualifications.

APESMA's flexible model would also see pharmacists being able to 'practice' medication management outside of a pharmacy setting, 'thereby separating the pharmacist service from the restrictions around PBS remuneration'.

APESMA suggested remuneration for the service would be based on demonstrated outcomes, separate from PBS funding.

scheme through pharmacy would cut the need to burden Medicare, where patients with minor ailments currently go to a doctor instead of seeing an accessible health professional like a pharmacist," Sclavos said

"Surely noone believes that Australians are the sickest people in the world...what [the report] clearly shows is inefficient use of health resources," he added.

Sclavos also responded to comments by the AMA (PD 05 Feb) which urged that education and awareness of health issues should come first of all from GPs.

"It is now wonder our health system is struggling, with this view that only doctors should see patients in the first instance," Sclavos said.

He added that the high rate of doctor visits in Australia also helped build a clear case for PBS Medication Continuance through community pharmacy, as well as other professional programs - such as, for example, pharmacist immunisation, which now occurs in all states of the USA.

"Pharmacists are willing and ready and they would not be a burden on MBS," Sclavos concluded.

President attends PSA

THE president of the Chinese Pharmaceutical Association, Professor Sang Guowei, has been confirmed to officiate the opening ceremony of the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia's 2010 Annual Offshore Conference.

Guowei, who is also the vice chairperson of the National People's Conference, said he would be 'delighted' to welcome delegates to the conference, held in China between 28 April-07 May.

"Our presence in China has been warmly welcomed by the Chinese Pharmaceutical Association which sees this as an opportunity to strengthen relations with Australian pharmacy and help progress their professional advancement," said PSA president, Warwick Plunkett.

The PSA has also invited 15 nominated members of the Chinese Pharmaceutical Association and the Chinese Minister for Health, Professor Chen Zhu, to the conference as a mark of respect.

Sanofi acquisition

SANOFI-AVENTIS this morning announced the expansion of its Consumer Healthcare portfolio, with the acquisition of the Ostelin range of Vitamin D and Calcium supplements.

MD Jez Moulding said the deal would "provide excellent business growth opportunities for Australian pharmacies, as well as exceptional care for customers."

Ostelin was previously distributed by Boots Healthcare, owned by Reckitt Benckiser, and financial details of the deal weren't disclosed.

Moulding said the acquisition was an "excellent addition to our broader prescription bone health portfolio," Moulding said, with brands such as Actonel also playing a crucial role in patient care and management of osteoporosis.

Changes to codeine

THE Pharmacy Guild of Australia's Qld branch is warning pharmacists to be prepared for the new codeine scheduling changes, which come into effect from 01 May.

The changes will mean that no analgesic product containing codeine will, from May, be available under Schedule 2, whilst analgesic products which contain up to five days treatment with a maximum dosage of 12mg codeine will only be available under Schedule 3.

Analgesic products that contain more than five days dosage and higher than 12mg of codeine will only be available via prescription.

The move was announced last year by the NDPSC in response to reports of codeine abuse.

Australia has cheapest drugs

AUSTRALIA has the lowest prices among the developed nations for medicines made by innovative pharmaceutical companies, according to a new report by the UK's Department of Health.

The report to the UK parliament compared the price of 150 popular branded medicines in the UK to their prices in 11 European countries as well as America and Australia, with findings showing that only Australia was significantly lower than the UK.

The report has been hailed by Medicines Australia, with ceo Brendan Shaw saying it shows that "the prices Australia pays for new medicines are amongst the lowest in the developed world."
