Methoxyflurane move

THE Health Department has released a new Emergency Treatment Program which provides for medicines such as Penthrox (methoxyflurane) to be listed as a special pharmaceutical product under section 100AA, for supply as a doctor's bag item for emergency treatment.

Pentrhox is methoxyflurane liquid for inhalation 999.9mg per g 3ml (with inhaler) and is not available for prescribing as a general pharmaceutical benefit but is approved for emergency treatment by doctors or in hospital.

"Availablility on prescription for supply in the usual way would be inappropriate as it would allow for the direct supply of methoxyflurane to community-based patients and as such has the potential for use without supervision by personnel trained in its use," an official statement said.

The change is effective 01 May and will be administered the same was as other Doctor's Bag items.

eRx Script Exchange

ERX Script Exchange has come out in support of the new eprescribing incentive payments announced in the Fifth Community Pharmacy Agreement describing them as a 'win-win' for pharmacy.

"The funding of e-prescribing is terrific news for Australian health care, and we commend the leadership of the Pharmacy Guild and Federal Government in this area," said eRx Script Exchange chairman, Graham Cunningham.

From 01 Jul this year, all pharmacies will receive 15 cents for e-prescriptions dispensed using an approved electronic exchange system such as eRx and the rival MediSecure.

eRx, an initiative of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia, has urged all pharmacists who have not yet signed-up to an e-prescribing system to do so before the

Groups put patients at risk?

MEDICINES Australia has today urged the government to abolish its Therapeutic Groups policy which forces medicines in each group to be priced according to the cheapest drug in the classification.

Speaking at a Senate Community Affairs References Committee enquiry into the policy this morning, Medicines Australia chairman Will Delaat said it "is not at all clear whether these medicines are interchangeable."

He also slammed the mandatory Cabinet approval for new medicines costing the PBS more than \$10 million per annum before they can be listed, saying this policy should be reviewed "so that patients can have earlier access to the medicines they need".

Delaat said the need for Cabinet approval can delay the listings of the medicines for up to 12 months or more - despite the items having

THE US Patent Office has granted 'preclinical stem cell engineering company' ViaCyte three patents for methods it has developed for use in possible stem cell treatments for diabetes.

The patents extend to its 'Methods for Increasing Definitive Endoderm Production', 'Methods of Producing Pancreatic Hormones' and the company's 'Definitive Endoderm' production procedure.

Certified technicians

THE US State of Idaho is enforcing new legislation which requires all pharmacy technicians to be officially certified.

The state's Board of Pharmacy said the move was a response to national pharmacy chains which have begun hiring fewer pharmacists and relying more on technicians to assist with dispensing.

"So the Cabinet approval process doesn't make sense," he said, urging that at the very least the \$10m threshold should be doubled.

"As a direct result of this policy, patients may experience deterioration of their condition before gaining access to their medicine - even premature death," Delaat fumed.

As far as the therapeutic groups go, Delaat said there were patient safety concerns about whether the medicines covered are "truly interchangeable on an individual patient basis."

Sunscreen guideline move

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration has published new proposed guidelines for the regulation of sunscreens.

The changes would apply to the Australian Regulatory Guidelines for OTC Medicines, with the proposal set to see the document "provide a complete, clear and single source of information on Australian requirements for sunscreen regulated as therapeutic goods".

The revision would replace the current chapter 10 'Sunscreens' in the guidelines and is a 32-page document comprehensively covering a range of topics including definitions of therapeutic or cosmetic subscreens, labelling, SPF testing, stability testing, microbial content and active ingredients.

FDA combo pill OK

THE US Food and Drug Administration has granted approval to Natazia, which is a combination hormonal tablet for use as an oral contraceptive.

Natazia contains an oestrogen (estradiol valerate) and a progestin (dienogist) and is the first =contraceptive to be marketed in the US which has four phases of variation through each 28-day cycle.

It also lists approved ingredients as well as clarifying the proposal for naming of new substances if they're to be used in sunscreens.

Doctors blast S3 chloramphenicol

THE Australian Medical
Association and the Royal
Australian and NZ College of
Ophthalmologists says they strongly
disagree with this month's
rescheduling of chloramphenical
eye drops from prescription-only to
S3, with RANZCO President Dr
Richard Stawell saying the
medicine should be reserved for
bacterial eye infections.

"Pharmacists have not been trained to be competent in diagnosing eye disease and do not have the appropriate equipment to properly examine an eye," he said.

"It is very important that it is not used indiscriminately," Stawell added.

New Minfos Scanner

MINFOS has released an enhanced version of its wireless scanning device which includes the capability to carry out a range of ordering tasks.

The scanner works by allowing pharmacy staff to create and edit orders by scanning the product.

"The improved functionality means that repetitive manual tasks which might normally take a staff member all afternoon can now be done on the wireless scanner in a matter of minutes," said Minfos manager Matt Lalor.

Currently the device is already in place in 50 pharmacies across the country, and according to Lalor, he has already received "excellent feedback" with some pharmacies saying the scanner is saving between two and three hours per day.
