## FDA Benadryl alert

THE US Food and Drug Administration has issued a warning regarding the potentially harmful side-effects of swallowing Benadryl Extra Strength Itch Stopping Gel, which is an OTC topical treatment.

The warning follows a spate of incidents whereby patients accidently ingested the gel instead of another Benadryl product, and suffered side effects including confusion, hallucinations and loss of consciousness.

"Consumer confusion and incorrect product use are serious public health issues," said Carol Holquist, R.Ph., director of FDA's Division of Medication Error Prevention and Analysis.

"FDA is advising consumers and pharmacies to store products for the skin separately from products that should be swallowed," she added.

An open letter from Armour and other colleagues including Gregory Peterson of the University of Tasmania, Lynne Emmerton from the University of Queensland, Kay Stewart from Monash University and Jeff Hughes of the Curtin University of Technology, slams the move, saying "How can this be?

"The absence of ongoing funding for these two programs was announced at the end of a series of pilot and randomised controlled implementation trials, all of which demonstrated positive improvements in patient health in primary care as a result of structured pharmacist interventions."

According to the programs' development teams, until funding was cut off both schemes had produced significant mprovements in patient health outcomes "equivalent to adding [a] new therapy, at a much lower cost than adding new drugs to the PBS.

"Indeed, the services are highly cost effective. Importantly, patients have appreciated the value of these services and how they fill a gap in, or complement diabetes or asthma care delivered by other health care professionals," the statement said.

Flagship programs neglected

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The two programs included pharmacist remuneration, which according to the group, was in keeping with modern trends of moving pharmacy away from a purely product focus to a more intergrated model of medication management.

"At a time when we are so worried about not only costs, but also the increased burden of chronic disease, it would seem that these services should be integral to our primary care strategy," they said.

"The scrapping of these professional services represents a lost opportunity for both the profession and the community to make better use of its health care workforce in combating and managing chronic disease.

"In addition, it contradicts the recommendations of the Australia's Health Workforce Research report," the statement added.

The pharmacist academics are urging their colleagues from across the industry to "take any opportunity to lobby decision makers and advocate for the need to integrate pharmacists into the health-care team in delivering chronic disease management for the benefit of the community, the government and the profession".

# US pharmacy crash

A MAJOR pharmacy group which supplies medications to residents of more than 400 institutions in the USA has filed for bankruptcy.

Chem Rx corporation is the third biggest "long-term care pharmacy" in the US and provides over six million scripts to more than 69,000 people each year.

THE chief financial officer of troubled pharmaceutical manufacturer Sigma, Mark Smith, has today announced his resignation effectively immediately.

A statement to the Stock Exchange this morning revealed only that Smith had resigned "to pursue other interests".

Mark Watson, a partner with accounting firm KPMG, will act in the role until the board has identified and appointed a replacement, the company said.

Smith's resignation follows hot on the heels of Sigma's former chief executive officer Elmo De Alwis' exit, which eventually followed the company's massive writedown of its generics business.

Shareholders have been critical of the Sigma management team after the company not only recorded serious losses but then allegedly delayed the financial results from publication and suspended trading

to protect itself from severe share plunges until after it had finally released the results, some weeks after they were due.

Shares in the company have now slumped to just 34c each - about a third of their level just six weeks ago.

Sigma's earnings prospects have also been downgraded in recent days by a number of analysts concerned about the impact of the new Medicines Australia pact with the government (PD yesterday) which is likely to impact on the generics industry.
