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Roxon asks for report on Soliris

AGITATION by a patient group suffering from paroxysmal nocturnal haemoglobinuria (PD yesterday) has prompted Health Minister Nicola Roxon to make an "urgent request for further advice" from the Pharmaceutical Benefits Committee on the potential benefits of adding Soliris (eculizumab) to the Government's Life Saving Drugs Program (LSDP).

She said the PBAC had recommended that Soliris be considered for inclusion in the LSDP but had also cited doubts on the extent to which the drug - one of the world's most expensive medications - extends life compared to best supportive care.

"It is a condition of funding drugs under the LSDP that there must be evidence acceptable to the PBAC to predict that a patient's lifespan will be substantially extended as a direct consequence of the use of the drug," Roxon said.

She added that the Government understands that he matter is important and has asked the PBAC to reconsider Soliris as quickly as possible for potential subsidy - with the PBAC set to ask the drua's sponsor, Cedarglen Investments, if any new evidence has become available as to its effectiveness.

An estimated 75 Australians suffer from the extremely rare blood disorder treated with Soliris.

15c eScript payment

A NUMBER of Pharmacy Daily readers have asked us to point out that the 15c per prescription payment to pharmacists under the Fifth Community Pharmacy Agreement (PD 04 May) will only partly offset the costs charged by the providers of the electronic prescription exchanges, which are set to charge about 25c per script.



PSA launches issues paper

THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia is encouraging all sectors of the pharmacy industry to take part in a consultation process launched today to help shape the future of pharmacy in Australia.

The PSA has released an Issues Paper on the Future of Pharmacy as a first step, which is hoped to lead to a White Paper for the Pharmacy Profession next year, endorsed by all stakeholders.

PSA National President Warwick Plunkett told **PD** yesterday the changing demographics in Australia and the government's focus on primary care and health reform are likely to "present challenges to the roles played by pharmacists and other health professionals."

The recent signing of the Fifth Community Pharmacy Agreement gives some breathing space for all parts of pharmacy to have input into the process, Plunkett said.

The PSA paper aims to kick off the process, giving an overview of the current status of pharmacy in Australia and hoping to stimulate debate on the challenges and opportunities for the profession in coming years.

"Some of the issues we will need to examine are change and change management, remuneration, the workforce and health reform processes, to name but a few.

"The changes and challenges for pharmacy are not unique to Australia, and other countries have similarly sought to establish a vision for the future of pharmacy which will undoubtedly have some lessons for the Australian experience," Plunkett said, referring in particular to similar profession-wide processes undergone in the UK and Canada.

The issues paper looks at the future viability of pharmacy, possible alternative remuneration models, integration of hospital and community pharmacy services and the pharmacy workforce.

The paper is now online, and it's hoped that groups such as the Guild, SHPA and other parts of the profession will also contribute ideas.

The consultation is likely to be the focus of part of the PSA's Pharmacy Australia Congress to be held in Melbourne at the end of October.

Sigma now a target

SIGMA Pharmaceuticals today said that it had received a "nonbinding, indicative and conditional proposal" to acquire all of its issued capital (PD breaking news).

The proposed deal, from an unnamed suitor, quotes a price of \$0.60 per share - almost twice the current level of around 35c, where Sigma is languishing following its profit downgrade and the resignation of key executives and board members incl former ceo Elmo de Alwis.

Siama's board advised shareholders to take no action on the bid at this stage.

COPD prevalence

ABOUT six million people in Australia suffered from chronic respiratory diseases in 2004-05, according to a report released yesterday by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare.

A third of those were afflicted with asthma - including 16% of Indigenous Australians, while 3.2 million were affected by hayfever and 1.8m had chronic sinusitis.

Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease affected almost 600,000 Australians, while diseases of the respiratory system were the third most common underlying cause of death in 2006.

Eli Lilly invests \$50m in Qld

MEDICINES Australia says the investment by pharmaceutical manufacturer Eli Lilly of \$50m in a Queensland biotechnology venture capital fund is an endorsement of the new Memorandum of Understanding signed between drugmakers and the govt before the Federal Budget (PD 05 May).

MA ceo Brendan Shaw said "This is exactly the sort of investment that having a strong innovative pharmaceutical industry located in Australia leads to.

"The predictability provided by the MoU provides the platform for pharmaceutical companies to plan their operations in Australia, and that includes their investment decisions," Shaw said.

The Brisbane-based fund will also attract a \$25m investment from the Oueensland government, with state premier Anna Bligh saying it will fund the development of biotechnology ideas

"Lack of access to venture capital has been one of the missing links in the development of the bio-tech industry in Australia," she said.

"This fund will fill that gap. It is a huge opportunity to drive investment in this new area of the economy," Bligh added.

The fund aims to help biotechnology companies commercialise their technology, with plans to "make Queensland a key biotechnology hub in the Asia Pacific Region," the Premier said.

UK shortages

THE Royal Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain says many of its members believe that medicine shortages in the UK have become worse in the last few months, with pharmacists "continuing to dedicate precious time trying to obtain medicines for patients, when they could be spending it on direct patient care".

THE quitarist in a German rock band has learnt a hard lesson after not being able to see straight for some days after taking too many Viagra pills.

20-year-old Tom Kaulitz from popular group Tokio Hotel said he was offered one of the blue tablets during a concert tour of Asia, and after first declining eventually decided to try one.

"The next morning my head was pounding and everything in front of my eyes was blurry. It wasn't fun any more," he added.

Luckily he didn't incur any sort of penalty for the drug abuse, which in some jurisdictions could result in a stiff sentence...

AND while we're on the subject, a veterinarian in New York has prescribed two Viagra pills per day for an ailing pit bull terrier.

The six-year-old canine suffers from heartworms, meaning she requires two 50mg Viagras each day to boost blood flow and prevent heart failure.

The dog lives in an animal rescue shelter which is now short of funding, and so is asking any generous male benefactors to donate any of their own Viagra which they're not taking.

Interestingly, one donation of Viagra came from a woman who pinched her husband's entire stash of the medication because she suspected he was having an extramarital affair.
