ARTHRITIS and osteoporosis are the most common cause of disability in Australians, according to the latest AIHW report on the use of health services for arthritis and osteoporosis.

Osteoporosis in Australia

The report, based on treatment figures in a variety of settings (including general practice, allied health establishments, specialist surgeries and hospitals) between 2007-08, revealed that across the nation, arthritis and osteoporosis are "highly prevalent long-term conditions", particularly among older Australians.

Between 2007-08 the report found figures showing 3.3m Aussies sought treatment for arthritis, whilst 692,000 sought treatment for osteoporosis.

In terms of the break-down of arthritis sufferers, almost one-half (1.6 million) had osteoarthritis; whilst rheumatoid arthritis affected the other 428,000 sufferers.

Females were found to have higher rates of osteoarthritis than males, clocking 62.6% of total cases, with overall majority of sufferers being over the age of 45 years.

On average the report's authors noted that osteoarthritis sufferers consulted their GP five times a year, tallying to an estimated eight million consultations per annum with 85.8 per 100 of osteoarthritis problems managed via medications.

Cancer approval

THIS month, the US FDA has approved Halaven (eribulin mesylate) for the treatment of patients with metastatic breast cancer who have received at least two prior chemotherapy regimens for late-stage disease.

A synthetic form of a chemotherapeutically active compound derived from the sea sponge Halichondria okadai, Halaven works by inhibiting cancer cell growth.

Second hand killers

SECOND hand smoke is responsible for the deaths of around 603,000 people worldwide per annum, 28% of which are children, according to a new report from the World Health Organization.

The report is based on "diseasespecific relative risk estimates and area-specific estimates of the proportion of people exposed to second-hand smoke" with data collected from 194 countries during 2004.

Findings of the report showed that in 2004 40% of children world wide as well as 33% of male nonsmokers and 35% of female nonsmokers were exposed to second hand smoke.

The period also saw 603,000 deaths attributable to second hand smoke, (379 000 deaths from ischaemic heart disease, 165 000 from respiratory infections, 36 900 from asthma, and 21 400 from lung cancer).

Female non-smokers accounted for the lion's share of second-hand smoke deaths at 47%.

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Servier faces lawsuit

PHARMACEUTICAL giant Servier is facing a costly legal battle in France, over the sale of its weight loss drug Mediator (Benfluorex Hydrochloride).

Despite having been taken off the market in 2005 by Spain and Italy due to growing concerns over its ability to cause heart damage, as well as severe adverse reaction notices within France itself, Mediator, said to aid obese and diabetic patients lose weight, was sold in France from 1976, up until its withdrawal in 2009 - after the deaths of 500 patients and 3,500 patient hospital admissions.

Adverse reactions to the drug ranged from breathlessness to severe heart valve problems, resulting in open heart surgery.

The drug has never been approved for use in the US and UK.

In addition to looking down the barrel of a criminal lawsuit launched by hundreds of former Mediator users (with charges including negligence and involuntary manslaughter), Servier, is also facing the prospect of a full scale public inquiry, as is the French health regulatory body.

Vigor-25 warning

THE US Food and Drug Administration is warning consumers to avoid the so-called 'natural' dietray supplement Vigor-25, marketed as a male sexual stimulant.

Sold on internet sites, as well as in some retail stores, Vigor-25, according to the agency, contains sildenafil, the active ingredient in the prescription drug Viagra.

Sildenafil is known to interact with certain prescription drugs, and may also lower blood pressure to dangerous levels.

"Tainted products place consumers at risk of injury and death, especially those consumers with underlying health conditions," said an FDA spokesperson.

Other 2010 Queensland PSA award recipients included Dr Danielle Stowasser who was awarded the Bowl of Hygeia for her leadership and innovation in the area of Quality Use of Medicines and Patient Safety; as well as Jessica Simpson from Narrabri, NSW, who picked up the Intern of the Year award (she studied in Queensland).

"Every year the quality seems to get higher and this year was no exception with the judges finding it a very difficult task to single out the eventual recipients of the award," said Queensland State President of PSA, Associate Professor Lisa Nissen.

"I think this highlights the very high standards of teaching and practice in this State," she added.

Weights for diabetes

A NEW study by researchers at the Pennington Biomedical Research Centre, has found that a combination of aerobic exercise and weight lifting delivers optimal results, as opposed to either one alone.

As part of the study patients exercised for 45 minutes three times a week over nine months, and the group which combined weights with areobic exercise in each session lowered their blood sugar, lost weight and reduced their waist sizes.

Study participants in the combo group also were less likely to take up new diabetes drugs than members of the aerobics or weights only groups.

"It's clear that doing both aerobic and strength training is superior to either alone," said lead author Dr. Tim Church.

"It's almost like taking two different drugs," he added.
