Nurofen says: don't panic

AUSTRALIAN consumers and healthcare professionals are being reassured over the safety of Nurofen Plus, with manufacturer Reckitt Benckiser saying the tampering incident (PD yesterday) is limited to the UK only.

"There is no reason to believe that [Nurofen Plus products] in Australia or New Zealand are affected," the company said.

The UK warning came last week, after reports that "rogue blister strips" containing other medications were found in some batches of the analgesic.

Police investigations are currently underway to determine whether the mixed medications are the work of a saboteur.

"We are taking this matter extremely seriously and we are working to investigate fully," said Dr Phil Berry, Global Medical Director

Erbitux onto PBS

TOMORROW will see the entry of thirteen new treatments on to the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme. including Erbitux (cetuximab) which is being listed for the treatment of patients with advanced bowel cancer who carry the "KRAS wild type gene" and have not responded to first line chemotherapy.

The KRAS test, which determines if patients are suitable for the drug, is not yet funded by the govt but is being paid for by Merck Serono.

The listing of Erbitux will make it available to an estimated 2000 Australians, with the previous cost about \$2000 per week.

Australians and Kiwis however should not be concerned about packet tampering, as according to Reckitt Benckiser, all Nurofen adult pain medications have a tamperevident safety seal.

"We have no reason to believe Nurofen Plus in any other country is affected," Berry said.

As a precautionary measure, the company does advise that consumers always check the safety seal to make sure it is intact before purchase, and users should also check the product name on the blister packs before consuming.

Pradaxa risk reduction

A NEW study has found that Pradaxa (dabigatran etexilate, 150mg bd) had a greater effect in reducing the risk of stroke, over warfarin, in patients with nonvalvular atrial fibrillation taking antiplatelet or other concomitant therapies.

Presented at the European Society of Cardiology Congress, the RE-LY trial post-hoc sub-group analyses found that dabigatran 150mg bd consistently reduced the risk of stroke in non-valvular atrial fibrillation compared to wellcontrolled warfarin [target INR 2-3], irrespective of whether patients used antiplatelet or other concomitant therapies.

Researchers also said that the benefits of dabigatran over wellcontrolled warfarin were consistent across patients using concomitant treatments.

New Australian CMO

PROFESSOR Chris Baggoley has been appointed by Health Minister Nicola Roxon as Australia's new Chief Medical Officer, effective immediately.

Baggoley has been acting in the position since April this year.

Last chance for a shot

PHARMACISTS have three weeks to lodge their application for GlaxoSmithKline's Adult Immunisation Grant (PD 04 July), after the company extended the deadline by a week.

The grants are designed to support adult immunisation by improving immunisation awareness, access and implementation.

A total of four GSK grants will be awarded in the 2011 program, each worth \$20,000.

GSK is encouraging healthcare professionals, including pharmacists, to submit their applications asap, if they haven't already done so.

Proposals that will be considered will revolve around projects that meet one or more of the following criteria: improving awareness/ education of the benefits of immunisation, improving immunisation practice and/or management; and improving access to immunisation in a specific disease area or patient population.

Each application will be judged by an independent panel of experts in immunisation and practicing GPs.
