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## 2011 Pharmacy wages down

THE average pharmacist earned \$34.38 per hour this year, a 9.3% reduction on last year's average rate of \$37.92, according to the latest APESMA survey.

Gauging the responses of 1,500 Australian pharmacists, the survey also found that 21.9% of community pharmacists have not had a pay increase since 2008, whilst 62.5% said that they regularly work through their lunch break.

APESMA also discovered that 21.3% of community pharmacists want to earn more by working additional hours.

"It is highly concerning that the average Australian pharmacist is

earning less than they did four years ago," said CEO of APESMA, Chris Walton.

"Given that inflation is rising at 3.5 per cent and the average Australian wage is going up by 4.9 per cent it is clear that pharmacists are being left behind," he added.

Interestingly the survey revealed that hospital pharmacists tend to enjoy better wages and conditions than their community pharmacist brethren, with 88% telling APESMA that they had a pay increase in the last two years.

In addition, nearly half the amount of hospital pharmacists (36.3%) regularly work through their lunch break compared to community pharmacists.

APESMA attributed the difference in wage and conditions between hospital and community pharmacists to the fact that the former tend to work in larger organisations "where it was easier for them to work together and present a case for better wages and conditions".

### DISPENSARY CORNER

DOES Claus have health cover?

### Methotrexate risks

NPS is warning health professionals to be alert to the risks associated with prescribing oral methotrexate.

Methotrexate, commonly used for the treatment of some cancers, is increasingly being prescribed in low doses to treat autoimmune or inflammatory disorders (usually in a weekly dose, which can cause difficulties for some people in making sure they take the correct dose on the correct day).

If the weekly dose is exceeded this may result in a high rate of adverse events, sometimes resulting in fatal toxicity.

"Methotrexate is taken either as a single dose once a week or as a divided dose at 12 hourly intervals over two days, once a week, and this dosage can translate poorly into instructions for patients," NPS said.

As such, the NPS has urged healthcare providers to stress the importance of taking methotrexate only as prescribed and to provide clear written and verbal instructions to ensure the regimen is understood.

In addition NPS has suggested that for weekly regimens, healthcare professionals and patients agree on a specific day of the week for taking methotrexate (preferably one of significance for the individual) and that they make sure once-weekly dosing is not confused with once-daily dosing.
