HEALTH students at the University of Tasmania will soon have better access to clinical training following a \$478,000 funding windfall, which will be put towards building an IT support network for students between the Uni and Tas health care facilities.

Zinc to heal a cold?

ZINC supplements may reduce the severity and duration of illness caused by the common cold, according to a new review published by the Cochrane Collaboration.

The review of fifteen clinical trials was aimed at determining the effect of zinc on common cold symptoms.

Trials included in the study were randomised, double blind and placebo controlled, using zinc for at least five consecutive days to treator for at least five months to prevent the common cold.

Following a collation of results, the reviewers found that zinc administered within 24 hours of onset of symptoms reduces the severity and duration of the common cold in healthy people.

"When supplemented for at least five months, it reduces cold incidence, school absenteeism and prescription of antibiotics in children," the researchers concluded.

In addition, researchers said that because of the potential for zinc lozenges to produce side effects, as well as the differences in study populations, dosages, formulations and duration of treatment, "it is difficult to make firm recommendations about the dose. formulation and duration that should be used".

NP's and promotions

A RECENT US study published in the American Journal of Managed Care has found that nurse practitioners (NPs) have "extensive contact" with the pharmaceutical industry promotional activities.

The study looked at 263 NPs from the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners with the aim of assessing their interactions with pharmaceutical industry promotional activities, as well as their perception of information reliability and self-reported prescribing behaviours.

The results of the study found that 96% of NPs had regular contact with pharmaceutical sales reps, 71% received new info on drugs directly from reps some or most of the time, and 66% regularly dispensed drug samples to patients.

In addition 73% of NPs said they believed drug samples were helpful in learning about new drugs, 81% said it was ethically acceptable to give out samples to anyone, and 90% said it was acceptable to attend a lunch or dinner sponsored by the pharmaceutical industry.

Interestingly, 48% of NPs also said they would be more likely to prescribe a drug that was highlighted at a lunch/dinner event

Ministers agreed that action needed to be taken to address these concerns and "restore professional confidence in the new National Registration and Accreditation Scheme for health practitioners".

"It is important that health practitioners who wish to continue to practise and their patients not be disadvantaged," the Communique said.

To this end, the ministers agreed to provide AHPRA with additional support and expertise, with the Agency now required to report to future meetings of health ministers, as well as to provide regular reports to the AHWMC.

The AHMC Chair, WA Health Minister, and Dr Kim Hames will also commence "immediate frequent discussions" with the management team at AHPRA "to ensure registration processes are on track"

In addition, the Commonwealth will consider initiating ex-gratia or Act of Grace payment for a period of time so that patients will not be disadvantaged by their practitioners lapsed registration.

Bonjela heats up

THE debate over teething gels in Australia which contain salicylates has heated up, with a spokesperson from Bonjela refuting the claim that the TGA is re-evaluating the risk/ benefit of teething gels containing salicylate (PD 16 Feb).

"The TGA has not contacted Bonjela to discuss this - which is usually the first step when a decision is made to review labeling on products," the spokesperson said.

"In fact, the TGA responded to this MJA study last week saying they didn't believe there were grounds for a review of the product at that stage," the spokesperson added.

Responding to PD's article on 16 Feb, the Bonjela spokesperson said that the alternative Bonjela product available in the UK (without salicylate salts) was not launched in Australia because it contains the anesthetic Lignocaine, which is not approved for teething gels in Australia.

In terms of TGA involvement, in 2009, following the publication of an article linking topical oral salicylates and Reye's Syndrome in BMJ, the TGA investigated the possibility that the use of teething gels containing salicylates may be associated with Reye's syndrome.

The investigation found that the case described in the BMJ was more likely to be due to salicylate toxicity than Reye's Syndrome.

Over the past three years the TGA has received three reports of suspected adverse reactions to the salicylate teething gel Bonjela, one of which was due to excessive product usage.

Whilst not confirming the launch of an investigation into the risk/ benefit of teething gels containing salicylate, a spokesperson for the TGA did tell **PD** that the agency "continues to monitor adverse events related to the use of salicylate containing teething gel and will look at additional warnings advising against overuse if required".

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Melbourne's disease

MELBOURNE has won the right to host the Western Pacific Congress on Chemotherapy and Infectious Diseases in 2016.

It is expected the event will attract around 1,000 delegates including physicians, clinical microbiologists, pharmacists, veterinarians and laboratory scientists, and will allow Victoria to showcase its homegrown work and research into infectious disease control.

"The Congress will provide Victorians with an invaluable opportunity to meet and share knowledge with global experts in their fields," said Leigh Harry, Chief Executive of the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre.

NATROPATHIC allergy clinic, Allergy Pathway (formerly known as Advanced Allergy Elimination), and its Director, Paul Keir, have been found in contempt of court and each fined \$7,500, for allowing false and misleading posts to remain on the company's Facebook page.

According to reports, the positive testimonials posted by Allergy Pathway Facebook 'fans' claimed the clinic's programs could virtually eliminate all allergies.

"While it cannot be said that Allergy Pathway was responsible for the initial publication of testimonials it is appropriate to conclude that Allergy Pathway accepted responsibility for the publications when it knew of them and decided not to remove them," said Justice Finkelstein

"Hence it became the publisher of the testimonials," he added.

The Contempt of Court charae against Allergy Pathway and keir was laid as a result of a 2009 Federal Court ruling that Allergy Pathway had engaged in false,

misleading and deceptive conduct in making certain representations made about its allergy treatments.

As such, both the company and Keir were banned from claiming that Allergy Pathway could accurately test for allergen's which cause reactions in an individual; or that it can cure, treat, or eliminate allergic reactions; that its treatments are safe/low risk; and that following treatment that a person may safely have contact with the allergen.

According to ACCC Chairman, Graeme Samuel, the latest Court Judgement is a message to businesses to "be careful if you're going to host a website, be it Facebook or Twitter or your own separate address that permits third parties to publish representations or comments in relation to your business which are misleading and deceptive".

"As the host of the website, you become responsible for them so you must take steps to have them removed," he added.
