Pharmacists lift outcomes

ADDING pharmacists to diabetes primary health care teams can see patients achieve significantly better blood pressure control, according to a study published this week in the Diabetes Care journal.

Researchers at the University of Alberta in Canada conducted a randomised controlled trial of 260 patients within several primary care clinics in Edmonton.

Greek pharmacists are revolting

PHARMACISTS across Greece have announced a series of strikes to protest against new legislation which aims to reform the Greek health sector.

Last week most pharmacies were closed for three days, and on Saturday members of the Greek Association of Pharmacists voted in favour of another three day walkout.

The Greek government is under pressure to undertake widespread economic reform as part of moves to handle the country's debt crisis.

The proposed legislation would mandate longer operating hours for pharmacies and also liberalise the granting of licences for new stores.

A major issue of concern for the pharmacists is a change which would allow any qualified pharmacist to obtain a license to operate a pharmacy.

Currently in Greece children of existing pharmacists are given preference when it comes to taking over their parents' businesses.

Drixine recall

THE Therapeutic Drugs Administration has issued a Class III recall notice for Drixine Paediatric Decongestant Nasal Drops 0.25mg/mL, 15mL.

The recall also applies to Drixin Metered Pump Decongestant Nasal Spray & Refill 0.5mg/mL 15 mL, with all existing batches affected.

Sponsor Schering-Plough said that a stability issue had arisen due to closures on some bottles being inadequately tightened to ensure an effective seal.

"The evaporation of liquid components under stablity testing conditions is resulting in higher concentrations of active ingredient and preservative in the products," the recall notice sayd.

Where pharmacists were involved they provided medication assessments and limited history and physical examinations, before making recommendations to optimise medication management.

Control patients received the usual care from health care teams which did not include pharmacists.

Patients treated by pharmacists were "significantly more likely" to achieve a 10% or greater decrease in systolic blood pressure after one year of treatment.

The study's authors concluded that "significantly more patients with type 2 diabetes achieved better blood pressure control when pharmacists were added to primary health care teams, which suggests that pharmacists can make important contributions to the primary care of these patients".

SWISS pharmaceutical company Novartis has announced the US\$470 million purchase of US cancer diagnostics firm Genooptix.

Genoptix has about 500 staff in its operations which specialise in diagnosing bone marrow, blood and lymph node cancers.

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Hospira stops making SPF moisturisers ineffective execution drug

US pharmaceutical giant Hospira has announced it will stop making anaesthetic sodium thiopental because it doesn't want it to be used for capital punishment.

Sodium thiopental is one of the cocktail of drugs administered during lethal injections in the US.

Manufacturing problems have seen the anaesthetic in short supply for about a year, and Hospira was planning to move production to its factory in Italy.

However Italian authorities will only allow the drug to be made there if Hospira can guarantee it won't be used in executions - which the company says is impossible to ensure because it's unable to track its distribution through several US wholesalers.

RESEARCHERS in the US have found that many common moisturisers promising to protect from sun damage in fact don't have adequate concentrations of SPF ingredients.

A study published last week in Archives of Dermatology examined the performance of 29 top selling facial day creams with claims of broad-spectrum UV coverage.

The products ranged in price from US\$3 to US\$64 per ounce, and the scientists tested each item for active ingredients including zinc oxide, avobenzone, octocrylene and ecamsule.

They found that "few products contain the adequate concentrations and optimal combinations of UV filters necessary to provide reliable UV-A1

There was no correlation between price and sun protection, with the most expensive item on studied having no UV-A1 filter at all.

The report didn't detail the names of the day creams studied, but they were selected from a list of the top-sellers on US retail website www.amazon.com.

The study's authors concluded that sunscreen labelling should clearly define the degree of UV-A protection, and until then health professionals should "educate their patients and the public to select products with ingredients that contain the appropriate concentrations of avobenzone, octocrylene, and ecamsule and/or zinc oxide.

Thiazides not so good

A STUDY published in the US this week has found that hydrochlorothiazide is much less effective than other blood pressure drugs, and could give hypertension patients a "false sense of security".

Researchers at the St Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital in New York reviewed previous studies and found that thiazides lowered blood pressure by only about half as much as beta blockers and ACE inhibitors.

In the 19 studies reviewed, low doses of hydrochlorothiazide reduced systolic blood pressure by 6.5 points on average, compared to 11.2 points for beta blcokers, 11 points for calcium channel blockers, and ACE inhibitors by 12.9 points.

Lead scientist Franz Messerli said the results showed that hydrochlorothiazide should not be used alone to lower blood pressure.

An enterprising soft drink maker in California has announced plans for a special new product range - fizzy drinks enhanced with medical marijuana.

Clay Butler says his new 'soda pot' will contain the psychoactive ingredient THC, and will be marketed in flavour varieties including 'Canna Cola,' 'Doc Weed' (instead of Dr Pepper), lemon-lime 'Sour Diesel,' grapeflavoured 'Grape Ape' and orange-tasting 'Orange Kush'.

The product will be delivered to medical marijuana dispensaries, with a retail price of US\$10-\$15 per bottle.
