Call for COPD patients

GLAXOSMITHKLINE is calling for 80 Aussies who suffer from chronic obstructive pulmonary disorder, to participate in a worldwide study.

The research is being conducted simultaneously in 40 locations around the globe, and will investigate the effectiveness of a potential new treatment for COPD that delivers two bronchodilator (airway-opening) medicines in a single inhaler once daily.

At present international and Australian COPD treatment guidelines suggest the use of multiple bronchodilators daily as required to help breathless patients.

Participants will be asked to cease using their current medications and will be provided with study medication free of charge for up to six months.

PROFESSOR Jobal Ramzan, Dean of the Sydney University Faculty of Pharmacy, has added his support to a review of pharmacy schools in Australia, defending Sydney from recent suggestions that larger unis are to blame for the oversupply of pharmacists in Australia.

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Sydney supports moratorium ratio, allowing for more time to spend with students," he said.

Ramzan said he also supports a moratorium on new schools, along with a freeze on numbers in existing courses, as well as an evaluation of current accreditation processes and standards.

He said that despite commentary on the oversupply, the Graduate Careers Australia report (PD 05 Jul) indicates that pharmacy graduates are in fact "securing full-time work at rates above other professions," with these figures backed up by employment rates for University of Sydney pharmacy alumni.

Sydney University would "happily contribute to a summit on the topic" as suggested by the Council of Pharmacy Schools, with Ramzan saying he supports an "educated, robust but respectful discussion about the issues so that the best outcomes are arrived at for this noble profession".

WTF are you FBing?

THIS year's upcoming Pharmacy Australia Congress includes a presentation from Senior Health Services Research Fellow in Medicine at Monash University, Greg Duncan, on how to use social networking sites, such as Twitter and Facebook, well.

The presentation will also canvass potential pitfalls to avoid.

"Numerous reports exist describing job losses, student exclusion and more in the pharmacy setting alone because of what has been accessible via a personal Facebook or other site that either identifies and/or criticises patients, gives unprofessional (and often uncivil) criticism of employers or teaching staff, displays of 'unprofessional' behaviours in social settings and so on," said Duncan.

"It is neither practical nor possible to prevent the use of such digital resources so guidelines for how to establish and manage a digital presence and maintain a professional public persona are essential," he added.

Qantas prostate support

QANTAS has announced a new partnership with the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia to improve Australian prostate health.

As part of the agreement Qantas has agreed to fly nurses from across the nation to centres where they will undertake training to become Australia's first specialist prostate cancer nurses.

As an added bonus the airline will also boost awareness of the condition via advertising and onboard announcements.

"Earlier this year I was tested and discovered that I had an aggressive form of prostate cancer," said Qantas ceo Alan Joyce.

"My doctor told me that there was an 80 per cent chance that I would have been dead within 10 years if it hadn't been detected when it was.

"I consider myself to be one of the lucky ones and would encourage all men over 40 to be tested regularly," he added.

The new prostate nurses will provide a nursing service for men and families impacted by prostate cancer in metropolitan and regional communities and help educate patients and other health care professionals about the disease.

The Prostate Cancer CFoundation aims to build the program to about 15 nurses within three years, and then increase it further to 50-60 nurses within six years.

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer currently diagnosed in Australia.

A NEW study involving Aussie researchers from the University of NSW and Monash University will look at the spectrum of the rare Fragile X mutation, which is a leading genetic cause of autism and intellectual disability.

Fragile X is affects the X chromosome, and can cause a range of physicaly and intellectual disabilities and behaviours.
