Pharmacy Expo wrap

Thousands of pharmacists attended the event at the Sydney Convention & Exhibition Centre, taking part in the extensive education program of 50 topics over 80 sessions.

Guests were welcomed at a cocktail party on Fri 17 Jun by Dr John D'Arcy, who also awarded the top stand awards.

MEANWHILE Guild President Kos Sclavos addressed about 120 pharmacists at the annual invitation-only Presidents Breakfast on Sun 19 Jun.

Topics covered included Current Issues in Community Pharmacy, as well as Using IT in the implementation of the Fifth Community Pharmacy Agreement programs.

It also included presentations by Albert Regoli of PDL who spoke on Reducing Dispensing Errors, as well as Tony Rush and Ray Moll of Guild Insurance, who spoke on Self Managed Superannuation Funds.

New competency framework

PHARMACISTS across Australia are being invited to provide feedback on a new consultation document about a new tool which aims to provide greater clarity for the National Competency Standards for pharmacists.

The Advanced Pharmacy Practice Framework Steering Committee (APPFSC) has developed the tool, which is particularly relevant for those who are teaching and preparing candidates for initial registration as pharmacists, as well as for the candidates themselves.

It's the first time that a "comprehensive mapping and customisation exercise ofentrylevel competency standards has been conducted from a professionwide perspective," said a statement from the APPFSC, which encompasses a range of groups including the Guild, PSA, AACP, ACP, APC, PDA, SHPA and the Pharmacy Board of Australia.

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration has warned about therapeutic quantities of sibutramine in Pure Fat Three Days Reduce Weight capsules, which have been purchased on the internet by some Australians.

The TGA is advising affected consumers to cease using the products and discard any remaining capsules, and to consult health practitioners if they have any concerns arising.

Telehealth launch

HEALTHminister Nicola Roxon and PM Julia Gillard this morning previewed Telehealth consultation services, which will be funded by Medicare for the first time from this Friday 01 July.

A joint video conference in Darwin and Adelaide showcased the technology, which allows video conferencing with specialists in capital cities from rural GP clinics, avoiing the time and expense of travelling for consultations.

Participating health practitioners are being offered increased Medicare rebates for Telehealth, bulk billing incentives as well as payments to cover start up costs of installing the technology.

API adds its voice to NPSA

ALL of Australia's CSO wholesale medicines distributors have united in their call for a stop to the exclusive distribution of PBS medicines via the controversial Pfizer Direct network.

Even though Australian Pharmaceuticals Industries is not a member of the peak National Pharmaceutical Services Association, API has added its signature to an NPSA communique which urges the government to "prohibit exclusive supply arrangements of PBS medicines to pharmacies".

It's the latest move in the NPSA campaign, and follows the release last week (*PD* 22 Jun) of a Deloitte Access Economics report which warned of the collapse of the CSO system if further manufacturers decide to go direct.

"Pharmacists need more than one source of supply and they need to be able to access all PBS medicines fromtheir full line CSO wholesaler," said NPSA president Patrick Davies.

"The signatories to the communique are concerned that patients will no longer be able to rely on their local pharmacy for supply of their essential medicines if the Government does not act now and demand that manufacturers of PBS medicines to ensure CSO distributors can distribute their medicines," he said.

Other participants in the communique include Symbion and Sigma Pharmacueticals as well as newly joined NPSA members National Pharmacies and Central Healthcare Services.

Indigenous scholarships

THE Pharmacy Guild of Australia vesterday announced the 2011 recipients of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Pharmacy Scholarship Scheme.

Tamika Hagan (University of Newcastle), Thomas Mylne (University of Queensland) and Shannon Unsworth (University of New England) will each receive up to \$60,000 during their time at university under the program.

Scholarship holders receive \$15,000 a year for up to four years of study to help cover the cost of studying away from home.

Winners also participate in a mentoring program tohelp establish pharmacy community ties.

The program is funded by the Department of Health and Ageing and managed by the Pharmacy Guild of Australia, and is an incentive of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Programs under the Fifth Community Pharmacy Agreement.

It's been established in recognition of the key role Indigenous pharmacists play in providing "improved, culturally appropriate pharmacy services to better meet the needs of Indigenous communities and patients".

MEMBERS of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain are currently being asked to vote on the introduction of a new **Pharmaceutical Scientist** membership category, with the move requiring approval by two thirds of those voting.

PHARMACISTS are being urged to actively encourage their patients with asthma to take control of their condition, following the release of new research showing increased risk for the two million Australians living with asthma.

One in five patients surveyed by the National Asthma Council Australia (NACA) said they were anticipating an attack every week this winter.

Generic warnings

THE NSW Pharmacy Council says it continues to receive complaints from patients "confused by the plethora of generic brands" available on the PBS.

In an update to NSW pharmacists, the Council says it appears that many pharmacists "do not take the time to explain the differences in colour, shape, taste etc for bioequivalent products".

The situation is further complicated by the fact that in some cases originators do not have a brand price premium, meaning the price to the consumer is the same whether a generic or the original brand is supplied.

"The pharmacist must spend time with the patient to explain bioequivalence, packaging differences...and ongoing vigilance to avoid medicine error," the Council urged.

Consumers should not be expected to frequently receive a different brand of the same drug

season predicted, the study has revealed that 65% of Australians with asthma surveyed do not have a current up-t-date asthma action plan," NACA said.

More than half of those polled had not been vaccinated against influenza, and a similar proportion had not seen a healthcare professional for a lung check this year, the figures revealed.

"Asthma needs to be taken seriously at this time of year, " said National Asthma Council ceo Kristine Whorlow.

"Preparation is thekey to avoiding unnecessary exacerbations and hospitalisations," she added.

NACA says initial figures for this winter suggest that incidence rates in 2011 may surpass those of 2010, which saw 70% rates of asthma attacks, and a 16% hospitalisation rate for those with the condition.

The study was undertaken online 03-07 Jun by Stollznow Research, with the support of AstraZeneca.
