New US orphan drug

THE US Food and Drug Administration has announced the approval of clobazam (Onfi) tablets as an add-on treatment for seizures associated with Lennox-Gastaut syndrome in adults and children.

The medication is intended to treat a condition which affects less than 200,000 people in the USA and has hence been granted orphan drug designation by the FDA.

Lennox-Gastaut syndrome is a severe form of epilepsy which causes debilitating seizures.

Aussie drug OK for Europe

AUSTRALIAN-developed cystic fibrosis treatment Bronchitol has been given a positive assessment by the European Committee for Medicinal Products for Human Use, with the move "clearing the way for the product to be used in Europe".

Manufactured by Pharmaxis, the company said it expects the opinion to be confirmed by the European Commission, with a marketing authorisation for Bronchitol to be granted by January.

Bronchitol will be indicated "for the treatment of cystic fibrosis in adults as an add-on therapy to best standard of care," with Pharmaxis ceo Alan Robertson saying the approval was good news for the cystic fibrosis community "which has supported us throughout the development of Bronchitol. "Bronchitol is a drug which was discovered and developed in Australia," he said, with the EU OK representing "the culmination of a great deal of work by many people."

Robertson said supply and logistics arrangements for Europe had already been established with Pharmaxis' marketing partner Quintiles, while Bronchitol clinical data had been made known to CF clinicians in recent publications and scientific conferences.

Bronchitol will be the first approved therapy in Europe to increase mucociliary clearance, a mechanism of action which has been shown to improve lung function and reduce exacerbations.

Currently approved in Australia for patients aged 18 and above, Bronchitol will also be part of an upcoming short clinical trial in children aged 6-17 "with a view to extending the licence to this age group," the company said.

Pfizer asked to explain

PFIZER will have to explain the circumstances of its patient support program to the Therapeutic Goods Administration, according to a report in *The Age*.

In letters written to both Pfizer and the Pharmacy Guild of Australia, the TGA is asking for an "urgent" explanation of the circumstances of their commercial agreement to discover if it breaches the Therapeutic Goods Act which prohibits the promotion of PBS medicines to patients.

The action follows recent media attention of the deal between Pfizer and Guild offshoot healthlinks.net which sees pharmacists paid an administration fee of \$7 to sign patients up to a support program which gives them access to information about their prescription drug directly from Pfizer (PD 20 Oct).

Both Pfizer and the Guild have defended the program saying in no way is it unethical because it involves prescription medicines and is not designed to promote any medications, but rather to encourage quality use and compliance with medicines.

According to reports as many as 18 similar patient support programs across the healthcare community are currently in use, however a spokesperson the Australian Medical Association told *The Age* that it was unaware of any programs in which GPs are paid to sign up patients.

MEANWHILE APESMA has again struck out at the deal saying "No Australian should trust emails coming from drug companies without getting independent advice from their pharmacist or doctor".

APESMA also criticised Medicines Australia for supporting the program.

"While Medicines Australia has come out in support of its donor they have failed to answer important questions about the controversy," said a statement from the union.
